

Kevin Lincoln (CA-13) Research Report

Significant Findings

Under Lincoln's Tenure As Mayor, Stockton Significantly Increased Fees For Water, Fire Inspections, And Utility Services Requests, And Lincoln Voted To Approve More Than 60 New Fees On Stockton Residents

- ✓ Lincoln suggested that as mayor, he would cut "burdensome fees."
- ✓ 2021-2024: Lincoln voted to adopt the Stockton fee schedule four times.
- ✓ 2021-2024: Stockton significantly increased fees, including for utility services requests, water, and building fire inspections.
 - ✓ 2021-2024: Stockton increased fees for municipal utilities with utility services requests increasing by nearly 15%, monthly water fees for single-family homes increasing by nearly 9%, and multi-family homes increasing by nearly 15%.
 - ✓ 2021-2024: Stockton increased building permit and inspection fees with fire inspection fees increasing by an average of more than 206%.
 - ✓ 2021-2024: Stockton increased permit fees for regulated professions by an average of 54% with security guard permits increasing nearly 90% and funeral escort permits increasing nearly 200%.
 - ✓ 2021-2024: Stockton increased picnic park fees by more than 11%.
- ✓ 2021-2024: Stockton added 61 new fees, including for inspecting fire hydrants, replanting trees, registering for youth sports, and using rooms at the civic auditorium.
- ✓ 2021: Lincoln voted to amend the fee schedule to add two new fees for small wireless facilities permits and reservations.
- ✓ 2024: While running for Congress, Lincoln acknowledged people in his district were "really hurting financially," and he suggested lowering the cost of living.

Lincoln Voted To Keep Stockton's Sales Tax The Highest In The County

- ✓ 2023: Lincoln voted to continue Measure A, which was a sales tax increase.
- ✓ 2026: Stockton was tied for the highest tax rate in San Joaquin county at 9%.

Lincoln Voted To Cut The Stockton Utilities Department Budget By 45% Over Four Years And Voted To Increase Monthly Water Fees On Family Homes And Consumers As Employees Went On Strike For Better Pay

- ✓ 2021-2024: Lincoln voted to adopt the Stockton annual budget and fee schedule each year.
- ✓ 2021-2024: Stockton's annual budget decreased the utilities department budget by 45% from Lincoln's first year as mayor to his last.
- ✓ 2021-2024: Stockton increased monthly water fees for single-family homes by an average of nearly 9% and multi-family homes by 15%.

- ✓ Stockton budget documents used two different accounting techniques to present past and future budget figures, making it look like the city spent less on water utilities, while it was actually financing costs through user charges.
- ✓ 2023: Stockton utilities employees went on strike, demanding higher wages and protesting alleged unfair labor practices.

Lincoln Touted His Endorsement From National Republicans After They Passed The One Big Beautiful Bill, Which Would Kick More Than 59,000 People Off Their Health Insurance In CA-13 And Threaten Food Assistance For More Than 50,000 Households In The District

- ✓ Lincoln touted endorsements from President Trump and Speaker Johnson after Trump signed the One Big Beautiful Bill, which Trump called “the ultimate codification of our agenda.”
- ✓ The One Big Beautiful Bill enacted the largest cuts to Medicaid in history, slashing local hospital revenue, and would kick more than 62,000 people in CA-13 off their health insurance.
- ✓ The One Big Beautiful Bill let ACA tax credits expire, driving up health care costs for more than 38,000 individuals in CA-13 on marketplace plans.
- ✓ The One Big Beautiful Bill enacted the largest SNAP cuts in history, threatening food assistance for nearly 48,000 households in CA-13.
- ✓ The One Big Beautiful Bill gave billions in tax breaks to the ultra-wealthy at the expense of working families.
- ✓ The One Big Beautiful Bill would add \$3.4 trillion to the national debt.

Under Lincoln’s Tenure As Mayor, Stockton Rents Increased By More Than 22%, Home Sales Decreased As Stockton Ranked As One Of The Most Overvalued Housing Markets In The Country, And Lincoln Voted Against Down Payment Assistance For First-Time Homebuyers

- ✓ 2021-2024: Lincoln served as mayor of Stockton.
- ✓ 2021-2024: Stockton rents increased by more than 22%.
- ✓ 2022: High home prices led to a 30% decrease in home sales in Stockton, which was ranked one of the ten most overvalued housing markets in the country.
- ✓ 2021: Lincoln voted against down payment assistance for first-time homebuyers.

Despite Campaigning On Addressing Homelessness, Stockton’s Homeless Population More Than Doubled While Lincoln Was Mayor, And He Voted Against Developing 300 Emergency Shelter Beds, And Stockton’s Homeless Shelter Accused The City Of “Financially Strangl[ing]” Their Operations

- ✓ Lincoln campaigned for mayor on addressing Stockton’s homelessness crisis and called it the city’s top priority, citing his personal experience within his family.
- ✓ Lincoln said mental health and addiction, rather than a lack of affordable housing, were the main contributors to Stockton’s homelessness crisis...
- ✓ ...But, under Lincoln’s tenure as mayor, studies found that Stockton was an expensive housing and rental market with households struggling to pay for basic needs.
- ✓ 2022-2024: Stockton’s homeless population more than doubled while Lincoln was mayor, and the city drove a trend of rising homeless numbers across San Joaquin county.
- ✓ 2021: Lincoln voted against developing up to 300 low-barrier emergency shelter beds.

- ✓ 2023: The Stockton Shelter for the Homeless accused the city of taking secret efforts to “financially strangle” the shelter while Lincoln was mayor.
- ✓ 2024: Lincoln voted to toughen Stockton’s ordinance banning camping in public.
- ✓ Lincoln called a \$4.3 million permanent housing project instituted by Stockton’s previous mayor “not fiscally realistic,” but praised a similar project started under his own administration with a price tag of \$30.3 million.
- ✓ Lincoln voted to approve ending Stockton’s COVID-19 eviction moratorium three months early and voted against giving residents an extra month to prepare for the program’s end after he took \$5,000 from a PAC representing landlords.

Lincoln Voted To Spend Nearly \$75 Million In Taxpayer Money For A New City Hall On The Waterfront, Including Furnishing The Mayoral Office, While Letting Public Infrastructure Sit In Disrepair And Underfunding A Community Park

- ✓ 2022: Lincoln voted to spend nearly \$75 million for a new waterfront city hall, including furnishing the mayoral office, a cost almost three times the original estimate.
- ✓ 2022: Lincoln voted to decrease Stockton’s capital improvement budget by \$23.3 million while old wood and stone curbs sat in disrepair and the city faced a negligence lawsuit over dangerous infrastructure.
- ✓ 2022: Stockton Record Headline: “City Council moves forward with increased costs for City Hall, cuts Pixie Woods funding down.”

Despite Speaking Of The City’s Needs For Equitable And Inclusive Investment, Health And Economic Disparities Between North And South Stockton Continued While Lincoln Was Mayor, And New City Developments During His Tenure Were Primarily Concentrated In The North

- ✓ Stockton had a history of inequitable development at the expense of South Stockton, where many Latino and Black residents lived.
- ✓ 2022: Lincoln spoke about the importance of accomplishing city initiatives in an equitable and inclusive way.
- ✓ While mayor, Lincoln voted for three development agreements in North Stockton and just one in South Stockton while ongoing development was concentrated in North Stockton.
- ✓ During Lincoln’s mayoral tenure, South Stockton continued to suffer worse economic, crime, and health outcomes than North Stockton.

Lincoln Voted To Draw On California Gas Tax Funds To Fix Stockton’s Streets And Bridges, Even Though Just Two Years Earlier He Voted To Use Millions Of Dollars Intended For Infrastructure To Upgrade Sports Venues

- ✓ 2024: Lincoln voted to ask California for \$8.3 million in gas tax dollars to fix city streets, sidewalks, and bridges.
- ✓ American Rrescue Plan (ARPA) funds were economic recovery funds meant to help governments respond to the COVID-19 pandemic and were particularly appropriate for infrastructure investments.
- ✓ 2022: Lincoln voted to spend more than \$1.5 million in ARPA funds on a new scoreboard and audiovisual system for the Stockton sports arena.
- ✓ 2024: Lincoln voted to spend \$2 million in ARPA funds to upgrade Banner Island Ballpark.

Lincoln Supported Letting States Ban Abortion With No Exceptions, Took Campaign Cash From Anti-Abortion Extremists, And Was Closely Aligned With A Group That Sought To Influence Politicians To Ban Abortion

- ✓ 2024: Lincoln said he supported the Dobbs decision, which allowed states to ban abortion with no exceptions for rape or incest.
- ✓ 2023-2024: Lincoln received hundreds of thousands of dollars from extremists who supported a nationwide ban on abortion with no exceptions.
- ✓ 2023: Lincoln said he would have voted for a bill restricting abortion for military members after stumbling over a question asked by a reporter.
- ✓ Lincoln said he was “extremely indebted” to a group that taught that politicians need to pass and enforce laws “concerning the fact that life begins at conception.”
- ✓ Lincoln served as executive administrative pastor for seven years at a church that promoted anti-abortion messages.

Lincoln Said He Was “Extremely Indebted” To A Christian Nationalist Group That Opposed Abortion And Gay Marriage, And As Mayor, He Honored A Local Pastor Whose Church Revoked His License Following Allegations Of Sexual Assault

- ✓ Lincoln called Capitol Ministries Bible studies “an answer to prayer” and said he was “extremely indebted” to them.
- ✓ As mayor, Lincoln told Capitol Ministries he had “the opportunity to lead and pastor a city” and that he wanted to make decisions for Stockton “through the lens of a biblical worldview” and “rooted in the word of the Lord.”
- ✓ Lincoln awarded a certificate of recognition to Stockton pastor John Shivers, whose Pentecostal church found him guilty of misconduct and revoked his license after he allegedly sexually assaulted two women.

Lincoln Violated Campaign Finance Laws Through Multiple Improper Transactions Between His Mayoral And Congressional Campaign Accounts, And Had A History Of Erroneous Financial Disclosures

- ✓ 2024-2025: Lincoln’s mayoral campaign gave nearly \$2,000 to his congressional campaign, in violation of federal election guidelines.
- ✓ 2023: Lincoln likely paid for federal campaign expenses with his local campaign, in violation of federal election guidelines.
- ✓ February 2023: Lincoln reported two different ranges for his wife’s income on two economic disclosures he filed the same day.
- ✓ January 2020: Lincoln erroneously filed an economic disclosure form as “assuming office” instead of as a candidate.
- ✓ 2018: Lincoln paid more than \$4,000 in late filing fees and received a warning from the California Fair Political Practices Commission over incomplete campaign finance filings.

Lincoln’s Business Was Sued By Baskin-Robbins For Trademark Infringement And Failing To Pay Franchising Fees, Faced Lawsuits For Unpaid Commercial Leases, And Lincoln Later Filed For Bankruptcy With More Than \$900,000 In Liabilities

- ✓ 2006-2007: Lincoln was named in articles of incorporation for JC Rasberry and signed as CFO for a Baskin-Robbins franchise agreement even though JC Rasberry did not list Lincoln as a company officer.
- ✓ 2009: JC Rasberry listed Lincoln as CEO.
- ✓ 2009-2010: JC Rasberry was named in two tax liens, which were later released.

- ✓ 2010: Baskin-Robbins sued Lincoln and his mom and step-dad for failure to pay more than \$21,000 in franchising fees.
- ✓ 2010: Lincoln and his wife filed for Chapter 7 bankruptcy in California after being sued by a realty group for unpaid commercial lease payments.

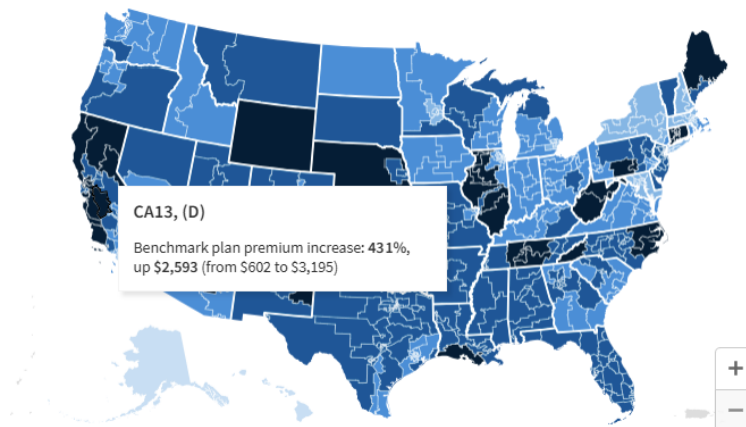

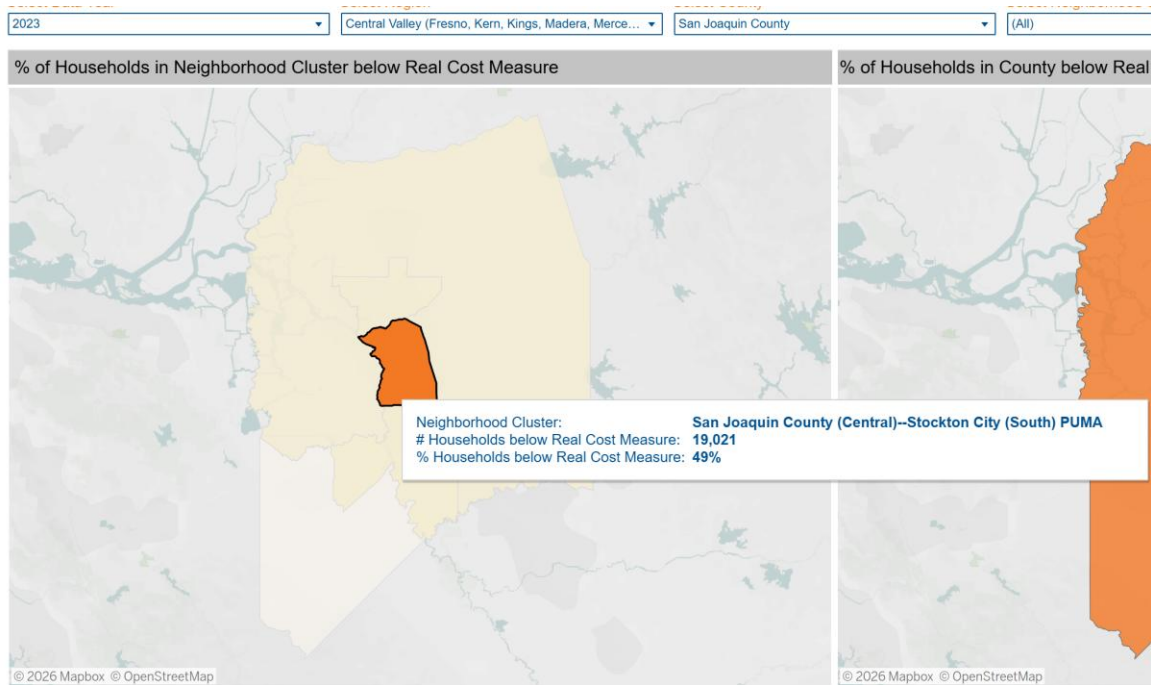

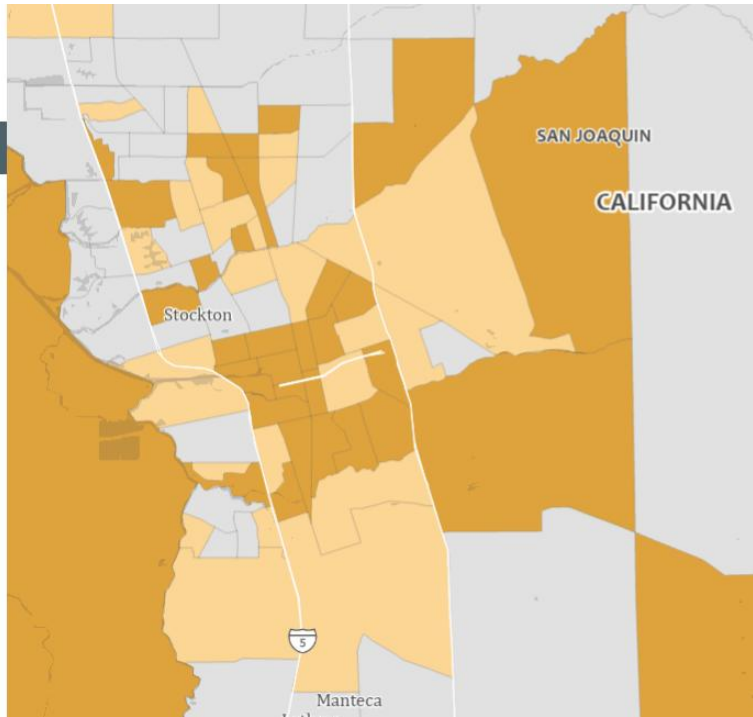

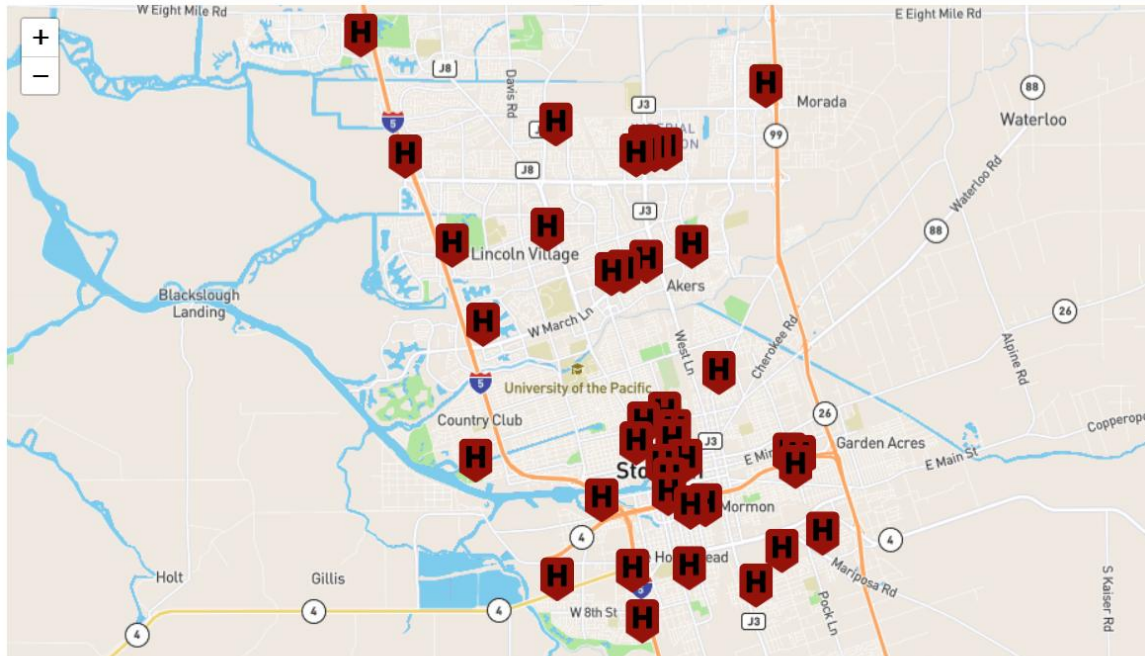

The remaining 5 (Idaho, Indiana, Mississippi, North Dakota, and West Virginia) have exceptions for cases of rape or incest but limit these exceptions to the earlier stages of pregnancy. Most pregnant people discover they are pregnant at 5.5 weeks LMP, though people living on lower incomes, younger people, Black and Hispanic people, and those experiencing unintended pregnancies often discover their pregnancies later. Of the 7 states with overall gestational limits between 6 and 15 weeks LMP, six (Florida, Georgia, Iowa, Nebraska, North Carolina, and South Carolina) have rape or incest exceptions. 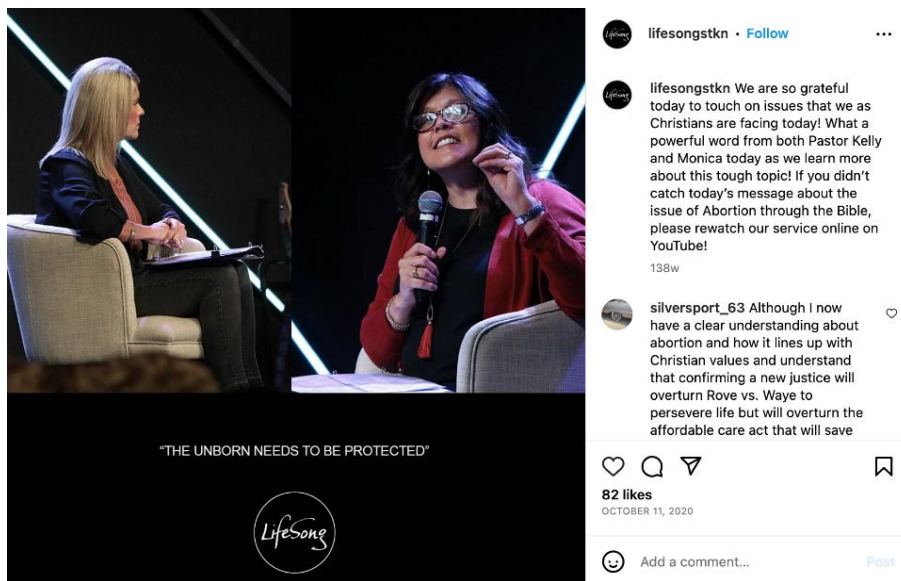

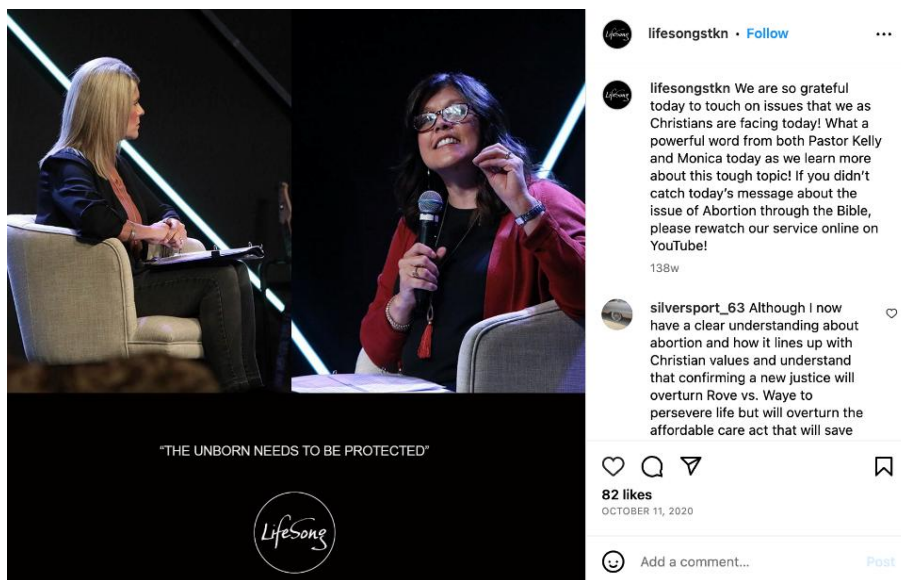

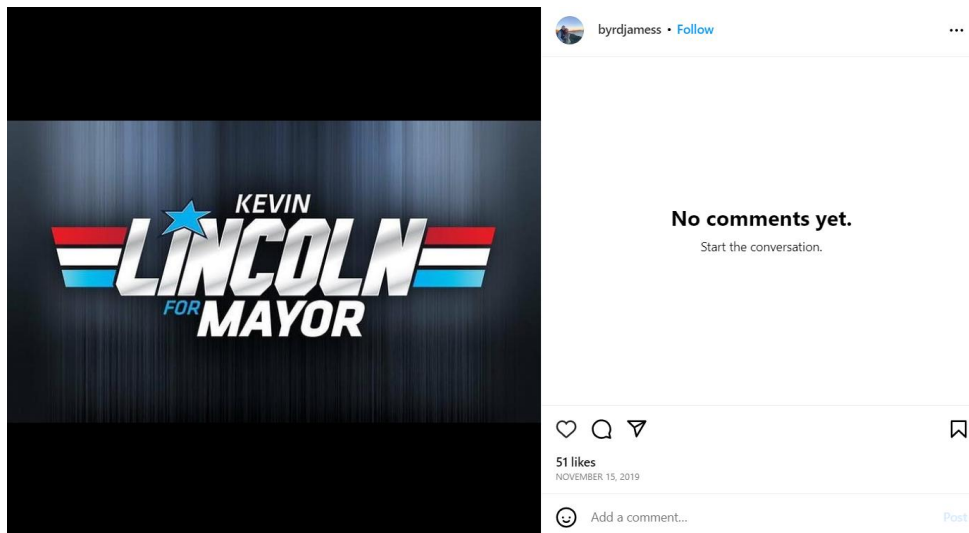

Federal Election Commission: “A Candidate’s Authorized (Federal) Committee May Not Accept Funds Or Assets Transferred From A Committee Established By The Same Candidate For A Nonfederal Election Campaign.” “A candidate’s authorized (federal) committee may not accept funds or assets transferred from a committee established by the same candidate for a nonfederal election campaign. At its option, however, a nonfederal committee of the same candidate may refund its leftover funds to its contributors and may coordinate arrangements with the federal campaign for a solicitation of those same persons. 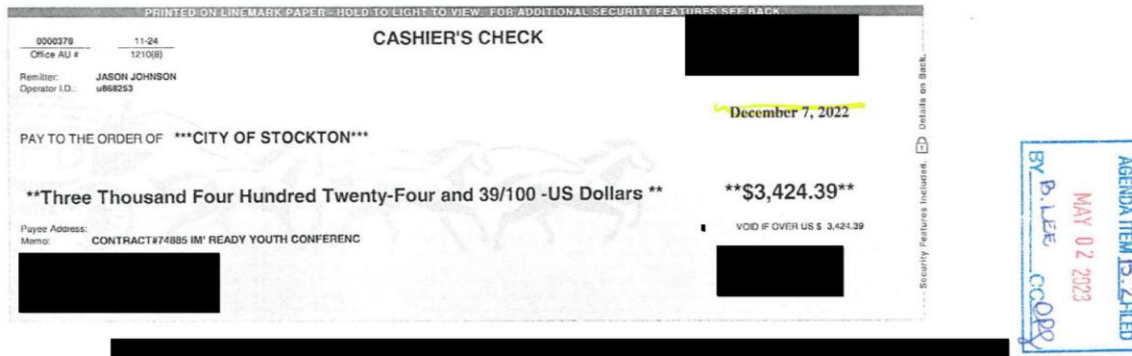
September 2022: Media Influencer And Stockton Native Jason Lee Proposed A New Youth Development Program Called “I AM READY.” “Stockton’s Jason Lee returned home Sept. 13 to pitch city council on a new youth development program to curb violence and increase academic achievement through pop culture. ‘The I AM READY initiative is about giving youth the ability to seek ownership over their readiness, whether it be financial literacy, leadership, civic engagement, behavioral changes, it’s more geared toward understanding their home,’ Lee said, ‘it’s there to make a difference.’ Lee, is a media influencer — seen on MTV’s Wild ‘N Out and VH1’s Love & Hip Hop: Hollywood — and founder of the newly minted nonprofit Hollywood Cares Foundation. He also is the head of media and partnerships for Kanye West.” [Stockton Record, [9/23/22](#)]

September 2022: Lincoln’s Mayoral Office Brought Lee To Speak To City Council. “Stockton Mayor Kevin Lincoln’s office brought Lee and the Hollywood Cares Foundation to speak to council Sept. 13.
