Stockton Recorded About 38% More Homicides In 2024 Than In 2021, Bucking A Statewide Trend Of Decreasing Homicides

2021: Stockton Recorded 39 Homicides. “Stockton has reached a grim milestone of 39 homicides, totaling the same number of homicides for all of 2021.” [ABC 10, [8/30/22](#)]

2022: Stockton Recorded 48 Homicides. “Five serial killings launched Stockton into national and international headlines last year. The other 43 homicides in the city in 2022 attracted less fanfare — though they may reveal more about the challenges it faces in keeping people safe. 2023: Stockton Police Department Had A Shortage Of 121 Officers. “As Stockton holds the second annual Flavor Fest at Weber Point downtown, the city’s police association is noticing a difference to just how many officers are deployed to these community events due to staffing shortages. [...] There are currently 364 officers on the force, but the department is authorized for 485, according to the department.
