Davis Defeated Buckhout By Outperforming Kamala Harris Even After Republicans Redistricted To Make NC-01 More Republican

2024: Davis Defeated Buckhout 49.5% To 47.9% Even After Republicans Redrew NC-01 To Make It Harder For Davis To Win Reelection. “The state Board of Elections reports that all 281 precincts in the district have submitted their tallies, and that Davis enjoys a lead of 5,826 votes (49.46% to 47.90%).

Libertarian Tom Bailey received 2.63%. The Associated Press only called the race on Thursday. Davis claimed victory in the wee hours of the morning. WRAL.com reported that Davis told supporters in Snow Hill shortly after midnight that he had won the race, saying, ‘We did it!’ Buckhout initially declined to concede and indicated she was exploring the possibility of seeking a recount, but ultimately abandoned that idea. The outcome of the race could be critical to control of the House, where Republicans have held a slim majority for the past two years. The Republican-led state legislature changed district lines in 2023 to make the district harder for a Democrat to win by removing Greenville from the district and adding several Republican counties.” [NC Newline, [11/6/26](#)]

It stretches from the beaches of the Outer Banks to the historically black campus of Elizabeth City State College to the busy streets of Rocky Mount. Trump won it by approximately 3 to 4 percentage points. But Representative Don Davis, a freshman Democrat, won re-election anyway. North Carolina Republicans Redrew NC-01 To Be More Republican, Shifting It From A Seat Trump Won By 3 Points To A Seat He Carried By 12 Points. “North Carolina Republicans have completed their mid-decade redraw of the state’s congressional map, placing a Democrat-held seat in the

state's northeastern corner in jeopardy. The GOP-led state House gave final approval to the new lines on Wednesday, a day after Republican state senators backed the revised map, under which the GOP would be favored to win 11 of the state's 14 congressional seats — up one from the current map. Democratic Gov. Josh Stein doesn't have the power to veto congressional and legislative lines in the Tar Heel State. The effort in North Carolina is part of a nationwide redistricting push this cycle by President Donald Trump and his allies, who are seeking to bolster Republicans' chances of maintaining their House majority in 2026. The redrawn North Carolina map dramatically reshapes the state's 1st District, a purple swath represented by second-term Democratic Rep. Don Davis, shifting it from a seat that Trump carried by 3 points to one that would have backed him by 12 points, according to data released by the state's General Assembly." 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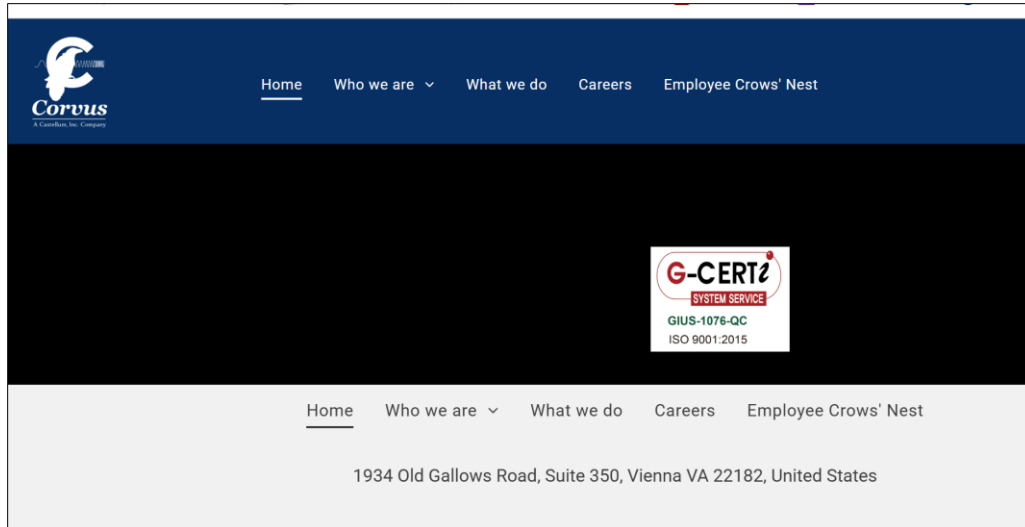

The measure would likely reduce the financial resources available to the lowest-earning 10% of U.S. households by \$1,600 per year, or almost 4% of their annual income, according to a report published earlier this month by the nonpartisan Congressional Budget Office. White House officials have previously questioned the CBO's scoring of the bill. But the highest-earning 10% of households would see a gain of \$12,000 per year in resources, while middle-income households would see a gain of \$500 to \$1,000, the CBO projected. Its analysis is based on the bill's tax breaks, as well as reductions for federal programs and reductions in state funds for safety net programs such as Medicaid and food stamps. In considering the impact of higher U.S. debt on future generations, the cost would come in the form of lower wages and higher costs, such as more expensive mortgages, Smetters said." The assessment, conducted by the Congressional Budget Office (CBO) at the request of top Democrats, found that the top 10 percent of earners in the country will see an average boost of \$13,600 per year over the next decade as a direct result of provisions in the law, while the bottom 10 percent will see an average annual decrease of \$1,200. The report challenges the arguments made by President Trump and other Republicans that the massive domestic policy package would benefit workers at all levels of wealth and income. The One Big Beautiful Bill Gave Corporations A Tax Windfall

Center For American Progress: The One Big Beautiful Bill Cut Corporations Income Taxes, Both Foreign And Domestic

The Big Beautiful Bill Permanently Reduced The Corporate Tax Rate From 35% To 21%.

"Provision details: The 2017 TCJA enacted large tax cuts for businesses, especially for large international corporations. The headline changes were lowering the corporate tax rate from a maximum of 35 percent to 21 percent and moving the United States from a worldwide corporate tax system to a more territorial tax base. Despite the comparative lack of focus on corporate and business taxes during the passage of the BBB relative to the TCJA, the BBB actually cut international business taxes more than the 2017 TCJA did. In particular, the BBB cut taxes on corporations' foreign profits by \$167 billion, while the TCJA's foreign tax changes were deficit-neutral on paper. The TJCA substantially cut taxes on corporations' international profits, incentivizing offshoring to reduce taxes. It was paid for by a one-time "transition tax" and the promise that tax rates on offshored profits would be taxed at higher rates in later years. The

BBB canceled the provisions that promised to better tax foreign profits. This effectively decreases corporate tax rates for companies' foreign operations." [Center for American Progress, [11/20/25](#)]

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The Big Beautiful Bill Cut Corporate Taxes By \$753 Billion Across The Board, And Awarded \$61 Billion In More Generous Business Deductions. "There are \$753 billion in broad-based domestic business tax cuts in the BBB, similar in inflation-adjusted terms to the \$650 billion in business cuts in the original TCJA. Many of the business tax cuts in the BBB take the form of cutting taxes on different investments, such as on research and development, equipment purchases, and certain manufacturing and production structures. The legislation also awarded \$61 billion in more generous deductions for business debt payments. Who benefits: The benefits of investment incentives, such as those enacted by the BBB, are subject to some debate. As discussed, decreasing taxes on corporations and businesses primarily benefits the executives and owners of those businesses. On the other hand, tax cuts that are tied to increasing investment, as opposed to unrestricted tax cuts tied to profits, can effectively increase investment. Provisions like the pass-through business deduction, the international business tax cuts, and miscellaneous tax cuts layer benefits on already profitable businesses; but provisions tied to increasing investments can have economically beneficial effects." NC Department Of Health And Human Services: North Carolina Would Lose \$50 Billion In Medicaid Funding Over Ten Years Because Of The Big Beautiful Bill

NCDHHS: North Carolina Was Projected To Lose \$50 Billion In Medicaid Funding, Which Would Disproportionately Affect Rural North Carolinians. "The North Carolina Department of Health and Human Services announced today it will begin preparing to submit its application to receive funding from the Rural Health Transformation Program (RHTP). The program is part of H.R. 1, a federal bill signed into law by President Trump in July to address rural health concerns due to federal cuts to the Medicaid program. NCDHHS has created a website with a link for providers to give feedback now on what should be considered for North Carolina's application and will host several opportunities for partner organizations to provide input for the state's RHTP application in the coming months. The Medicaid program will see cuts resulting in approximately \$1 trillion in losses nationwide in the next 10 years due to H.R. 1, including \$49.9 billion in North Carolina, and these cuts will disproportionately impact people who live in rural communities. 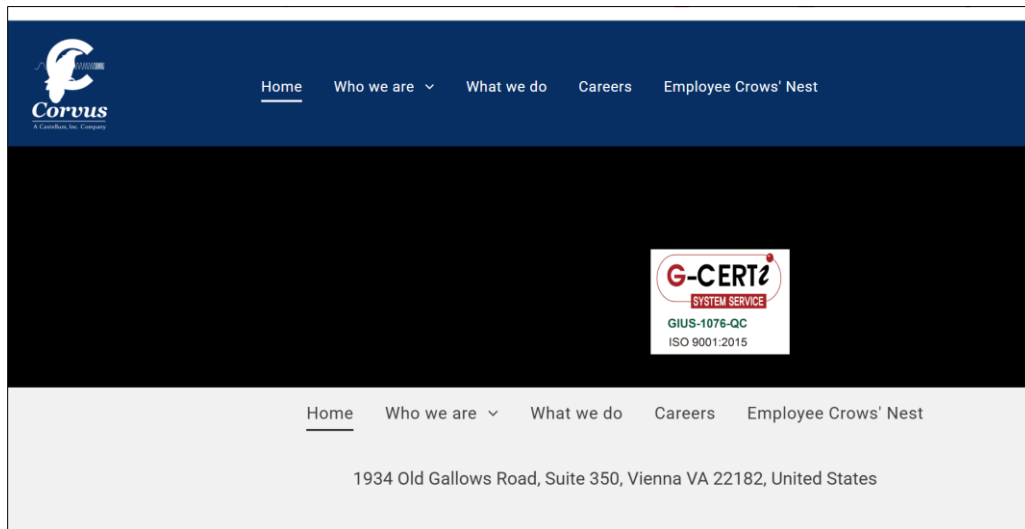

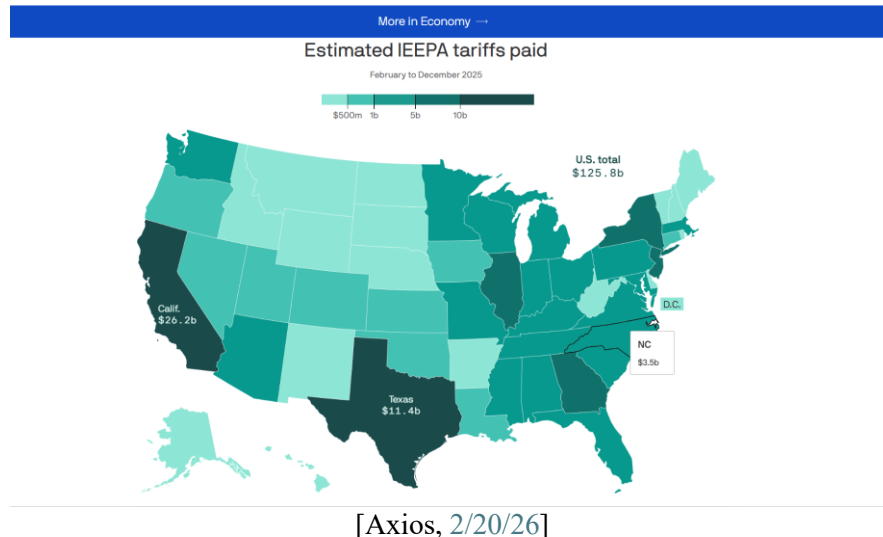

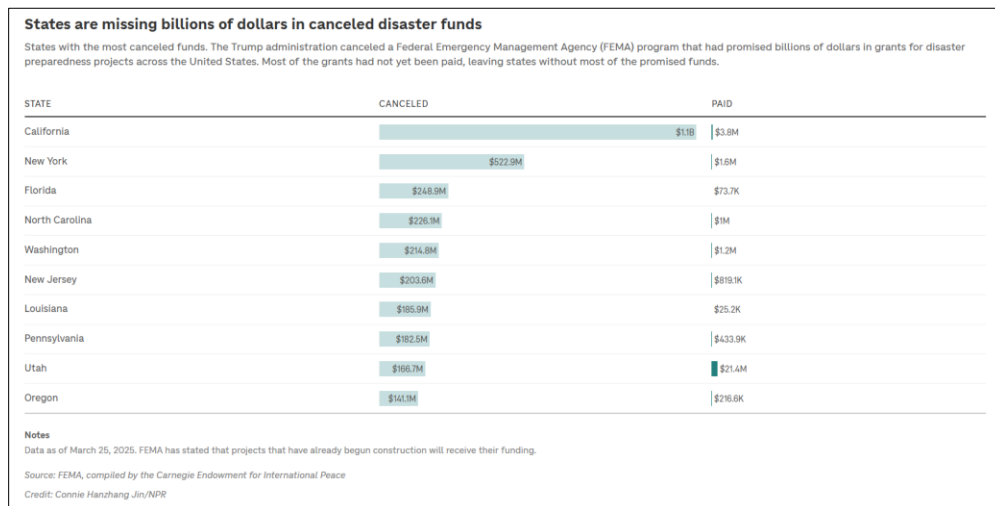

NCDHHS: North Carolina Was Projected To Lose \$50 Billion In Medicaid Funding, Which Would Disproportionately Affect Rural North Carolinians. “The North Carolina Department of Health and Human Services announced today it will begin preparing to submit its application to receive funding from the Rural Health Transformation Program (RHTP). The program is part of H.R. 1, a federal bill signed into law by President Trump in July to address rural health concerns due to federal cuts to the Medicaid program. NCDHHS has created a website with a link for providers to give feedback now on what should be considered for North Carolina’s application and will host several opportunities for partner organizations to provide input for the state’s RHTP application in the coming months. The Medicaid program will see cuts resulting in approximately \$1 trillion in losses nationwide in the next 10 years due to H.R. 1, including \$49.9 billion in North Carolina, and these cuts will disproportionately impact people who live in rural communities. 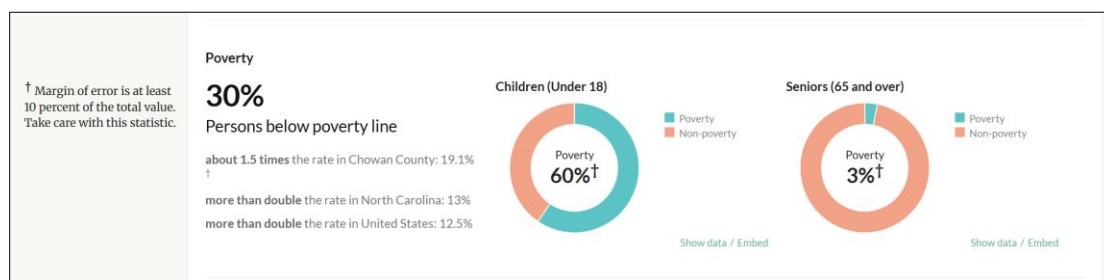

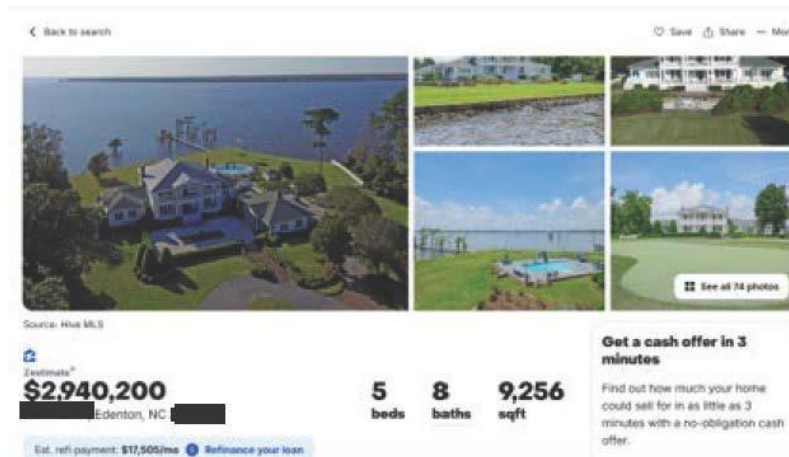

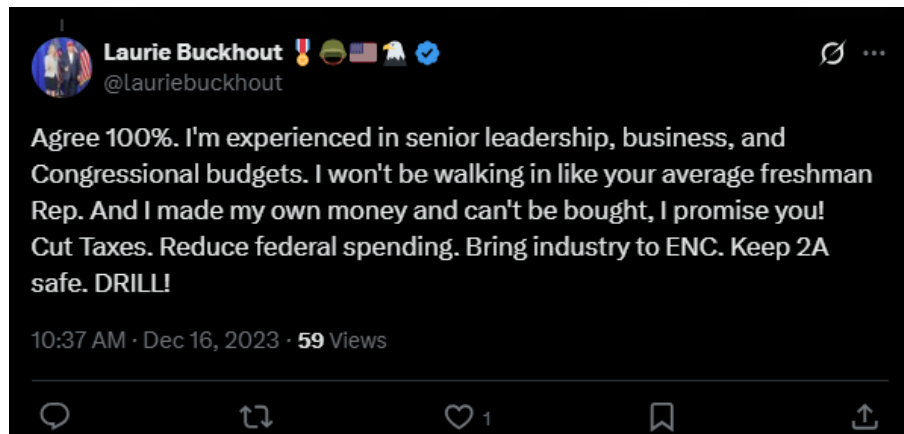
