#### Mackenzie Voted Against A Woman's Right To Choose, Without Exception

2022: Mackenzie Voted In Favor Of SB 106, Which Said: "That There Is No Constitutional Right To Taxpayer-Funded Abortion Or Other Right Relating To Abortion." "A Joint Resolution proposing separate and distinct amendments to the Constitution of the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania, providing that there is no constitutional right to taxpayer-funded abortion or other right relating to abortion; further providing for action on concurrent orders and resolutions, for Lieutenant Governor and for qualifications of electors; and providing for election audits." ### 2018: Mackenzie Voted In Favor Of SB3, Which Would Criminalize Medical Abortion "At Any Point During A Pregnancy" And All Abortions After 20 Weeks

**2018:** Mackenzie Voted In Favor Of SB3, Which Would Provide For A "Dismemberment Abortion Ban." "An Act amending Title 18 (Crimes and Offenses) of the Pennsylvania Consolidated Statutes, in abortion, further providing for definitions, for medical consultation and judgment and for the offense of abortion on unborn child of 24 or more weeks gestational age, providing for dismemberment abortion ban and further providing for reporting." ### 2016: Mackenzie Voted For HB1948, A 20-Week Abortion Ban Without Exceptions For Rape Or Incest

2016: Mackenzie Voted For A 20-Week Abortion Ban That Prohibited "Dismemberment Abortions" And Required In-Person Pre-Abortion Medical Consultations. Mackenzie voted in favor of House Bill 1948 which, "It will prohibit an individual from performing or inducing an abortion upon another person when the gestational age of the unborn child is 20 or more weeks, unless the abortion is performed to protect the life of the mother; or if failing to perform the abortion would lead to a substantial and irreversible impairment of a major bodily function. Under current law the prohibition is set at the gestational age of 24 weeks. It also adds a new section that prohibits 'dismemberment abortions' as defined in the bill. Exceptions to this prohibition are provided and differ based on the gestational age of the unborn child. The section also specifies that liability for performing a dismemberment abortion cannot fall on the patient or any individual involved in the abortion process who acts at the direction of a physician. Performing a dismemberment abortion is graded as a felony of the third degree, punishable by a fine of up to \$15,000 and/or up to 7 years in prison. House Bill 1948 also repeals provisions relating to spousal notice and clarifies that medical consultations that occur prior to an abortion procedure must occur in-person." Mackenzie Voted For A Bill To Require Doctors To Provide Women With Information On Perinatal Care If They Are "Diagnosed With A Life-Threatening Fetal Anomaly"

2019: Mackenzie Voted In Favor Of HB 1058 To Require Information On Perinatal Support Care Be Provide To A Woman After Receiving A Diagnosis Of A "Life Limiting Condition." "An Act requiring that information on the option of perinatal support care programs be given to a woman after diagnosis of a life limiting condition; and imposing penalties." • HB 1058 Would Require The State To Provide Pregnant Women With Information On Perinatal Care If They Are "Diagnosed With A Life-Threatening Fetal Anomaly." "Rapp's Compassion and Care for Medically Challenging Pregnancies Act (House Bill 1058) that would require information to be given to a mother on the option of perinatal care after she is diagnosed with a life-threatening fetal anomaly was approved 116-76 by the Pennsylvania House. [...] Perinatal care is a model of support for parents who choose to continue their pregnancies following a prenatal diagnosis indicating that the unborn child has a life-limiting condition and might die before or shortly after birth. Perinatal care is offered from the time of diagnosis through the baby's birth and death." [PA State Rep. Kathy Rapp, 5/8/19]

### Mackenzie Voted To Eliminate Abortion Coverage And Force Parents To Pay For Funerals Or Cremation After All Abortions

Mackenzie Voted Yes On HB 118, Regarding "The Final Disposition Of Fetal Remains." "An Act providing for the final disposition of fetal remains; and imposing penalties." Mackenzie voted in favor of the bill. [Pennsylvania General Assembly, HB 118; RCS No. 318, 6/9/21]

ACLU: HB 118 Would Require Health Care Facilities To Bury Or Cremate "All Medical Tissue—At Any Gestational Age—Following A Spontaneous Or Induced Termination Of A Pregnancy." "HB 118 would require a hospital or clinic to arrange for the burial or cremation of all medical tissue—at any gestational age—following a spontaneous or induced termination of a pregnancy, such as miscarriage, abortion, or in vitro embryo reduction that occurs within a healthcare facility. A healthcare facility that violates this act will be fined between \$50 and \$300 or a person charged with fulfilling these duties may be imprisoned in county jail for up to thirty days." 2013: Mackenzie Voted To Prohibit Coverage Of Abortion By Health Plans Offered Through The Insurance Exchange, Even When The Plan Was Purchased With Private Funds Or The Woman's Health Was At Risk

**2013: Mackenzie Voted In Favor Of HB 818.** "An Act amending Title 40 (Insurance) of the Pennsylvania Consolidated Statutes, providing for compliance with Federal health care legislation." Mackenzie voted in favor of the bill. [Pennsylvania General Assembly, HB 818; RCS No. 284, 4/23/13]

• ACLU: HB 818 Would Ban Insurance Coverage Of Abortion Care Except In Cases Of Rape, Incest, Or "Imminent" Threat To The Life Of The Woman. "In a continuing trend toward wresting control of women's healthcare away from patients and doctors, the Pennsylvania Senate today passed legislation to ban insurance coverage of abortion care in policies sold in the exchange created by the federal healthcare reform law. [...] On Tuesday, the Senate rejected the opportunity to amend the bill, House Bill 818, to provide greater flexibility for patients who participate in the insurance exchange. Amendments to allow abortion coverage when a patient pays with private funds and to allow an exception for coverage when an abortion is necessary to avert a medical emergency both failed. 'They're comparing insurance from Blue Cross with Medicare and Medicaid,' said Andrew Hoover, legislative director of the ACLU of Pennsylvania, 'Under this law a person could buy insurance with the exchange with their own money couldn't get abortion coverage even when their health was threatened.' I mean, there's no doubt about that. And that's what every business does every family does. You need to assess your finances on a regular basis. Why in Pennsylvania, I've been a fan of zero-based budgeting starting every year looking at your budget, figuring out what are the things that are appropriate, what needs to be done, and a number of years ago, a group there were about 12 to 15 of us that we were stuck at a budget impasse with our liberal governor. And we decided we spent the summer in a conference room in Harrisburg going line by line through the budget, figuring out areas where we could bring in that wasteful spending." Senator Johnson Suggested That The Whole US Budget, Including Medicare And Social Security, Be Evaluated Annually. "Republican U.S. Sen. Ron Johnson indicated that Medicare and Social Security should be subjected to annual budget deliberations, a move that could upend guaranteed benefits relied upon by millions of Americans. Johnson, who is running for a third term in November in a race that could shape the balance of power in the Senate, made his comments Tuesday during an interview on the Regular Joe Show, hosted by Joe Giganti. Federal spending is in two baskets — discretionary spending which comes in annual appropriations in areas like defense and public works and mandatory spending that is generally governed by statute and includes entitlement programs like Social Security and Medicare that provide guaranteed benefits. During the interview, Johnson was asked about the PACT Act — aid to veterans who have been exposed to toxic burn pits — and a controversy over discretionary vs. mandatory spending. In his answer, Johnson suggested that he seeks to turn everything in the federal budget into discretionary spending — including Social Security and Medicare — so that programs can be evaluated and fixed." This legislation would increase the minimum wage in Pennsylvania to \$11 per hour by Jan. 1, 2024; \$13 per hour by Jan. 1, 2025; and \$15 per hour by Jan. 1, 2026. #### Mackenzie Opposed Pro-Labor Legislation On Several Occasions

### Mackenzie Voted Against A Pennsylvania Constitutional Amendment To Guarantee The Right To Collective Bargaining

Mackenzie Voted Against House Bill 950, Which Would Have Added A Constitutional Amendment That: "No Law Shall Be Passed That Interferes With, Negates Or Diminishes The Right Of Employees To Organize And Bargain Collectively." Mackenzie voted against House Bill 950 which, "The following amendment to the Constitution of Pennsylvania is proposed in accordance with Article XI: That Article I be amended by adding a section to read: § 30. Workers' rights. Employees shall have the fundamental right to organize and to bargain collectively through representatives of their own choosing for the purpose of negotiating wages, hours and working conditions, and to protect their economic welfare and safety at work. No law shall be passed that interferes with, negates or diminishes the right of employees to organize and bargain collectively over their wages, hours and other terms and conditions of employment and work place safety, including any law or ordinance that prohibits the execution or application of agreements between employers and labor organizations that represent employees requiring membership in an organization as a condition of employment. Section 2. The following procedure applies to the proposed constitutional amendment in this joint resolution: (1) Upon the first passage by the General Assembly of the amendment, the Secretary of the Commonwealth shall proceed immediately to comply with the advertising requirements of section 1 of Article XI of the Constitution of Pennsylvania.(2) Upon the second passage by the General Assembly of the amendment, the Secretary of the Commonwealth shall proceed immediately to comply with the advertising requirements of section 1 of Article XI of the Constitution of Pennsylvania. The Secretary of the Commonwealth shall submit the amendment to the qualified electors of this Commonwealth at the first primary, general or municipal election which meets the requirements of section 1 of Article XI of the Constitution of Pennsylvania." #### Mackenzie Opposed A Bill To Give Workers On Strike Unemployment Benefits

Mackenzie Opposed A Bill To Give Workers On Strike Unemployment Benefits. "The Pennsylvania state House approved a bill Wednesday, Nov. 15, that would grant unemployment benefits to striking workers - a move Democrats said would level the playing field for employees, while Republicans said the measure would violate the intent of the benefit program. [...] Republicans said the proposal would violate the core concept of unemployment compensation, in which employees pay into a trust fund while they are working and receive pay from the fund when they find themselves involuntarily unemployed. 'When you choose to go on strike you are violating that premise, you are making that decision,' said Rep. Ryan Mackenzie, R- Lehigh County. While workers have a right to strike, 'what is not their right is to ask other hardworking Pennsylvanians to pay for them when they choose to go on strike,' Mackenzie said, and 'unless you come up with a way to actually pay for this, it's just a benefit drawdown for some workers that all workers end up paying for." [...] It is my sincerely held belief that instituting treatment guidelines in our Workers' Compensation system will control costs and will enhance return-to-work outcomes for thousands of injured and disabled Pennsylvania workers. ### 2017: Mackenzie Introduced HB 18, Which Would Limit The Range Of Drugs Available To "Workers Injured On The Job"

The bill would create a preapproved list, or 'formulary,' of opioids and other drugs for injured employees receiving medical care and financial assistance for lost wages under the Workers Compensation Act of 1915. ### Mackenzie Opposed Raising The Minimum Wage And Wage Reform On Numerous Occasions

2024: Mackenzie Opposed HB 2153, Which Would Strengthen Prevailing Wage Laws For Government Contractors. "State Rep. Ryan Mackenzie took a stand Monday against a bipartisan bill that would strengthen prevailing wage laws in Pennsylvania, arguing taxpayers would face artificially high costs as a result. House Bill 2153, introduced in March, would eliminate the practice of split rates. Currently, workers on government contracts performing two different roles on a project can be paid different rates for each role. As an example, a carpenter who also assists with manual labor wouldn't be allowed to be paid at a lower rate when when he's performing less skilled work. The bill would also require that prevailing wages are paid for employees doing prefabricated construction away from the community hosting the project. [...] Mackenzie argued the bill would pass along higher wage costs to taxpayers. Construction companies are increasingly turning to prefabricated construction methods to control expenses, but the bill would wipe out some of those gains, he said. On November 2, 2020 the office of the Secretary of the Commonwealth issued a directive to every county which effectively amended the Election Code by changing the manner of the conduct of elections. Both the decision of the Supreme Court of Pennsylvania and the directive of the Secretary of the Commonwealth violated the prerogative of the state legislature to make election policy as prescribed under the United States Constitution." The proposed Republican changes would have voters present ID every time they vote. Kenyatta said the proposal does not give minority voters more confidence. Two provisions—which impose a tax on global intangible low-tax income (GILTI) and create a deduction for foreign-derived intangible income (FDII)—reduce corporations' incentive to locate high-return assets (which are often intangible assets, such as intellectual property, or IP) in low-tax countries. The provisions reduce that incentive by applying special treatment to profits that exceed a specified return on tangible assets (such as equipment and structures). In addition to reducing profit shifting through the location of intangible assets, the GILTI and FDII provisions affect corporations' decisions about where to locate tangible assets. By locating more tangible assets abroad, a corporation is able to reduce the amount of foreign income that is categorized as GILTI. Similarly, by locating fewer tangible assets in the United States, a corporation can increase the amount of U.S. income that can be deducted as FDII. Together, the provisions may increase corporations' incentive to locate tangible assets abroad. (Like profit shifting, such decisions change the locations of reported profits—but they are not classified as profit shifting, because they involve actual economic activity rather than simply reporting.)" 2023: Mackenzie Voted Against House Bill 413, Which Was Intended To Prevent The Misclassification Of Employees As Independent Contractors In The Construction Industry.

Mackenzie voted against House Bill 413 which, "Section 1. Section 3(a) of the act of October 13, 2010 (P.L.506, No.72), known as the Construction Workplace Misclassification Act, is amended to read:

Section 3. Independent contractors. (a) General rule. —For purposes of workers' compensation, unemployment compensation and improper classification of employees provided herein, an individual who performs services in the construction industry for remuneration is an independent contractor only if:(1) The individual has a written contract [to perform such services.] that is project-specific and contains a particular scope of work and definitive time period to perform the services. (2) The individual is free from control or direction over performance of such services both under the contract of service and in fact. (3) As to such services, the individual is customarily engaged in an independently established trade, occupation, profession or business." 2024: Mackenzie Voted Against HB 335, Which Attempted To Ban "Multi-Burst Trigger Activators" Like The One Used In The Las Vegas Mass Shooting. "Imagine going to an outdoor concert with family and friends, but instead of great festivities and music, you were met with gunfire and screams. This was the scene when a gunman opened fire during a Las Vegas music event in October of 2017. The gunman had a dozen rifles outfitted with bump stocks and killed 58 people while wounding hundreds more. Bump stocks work by harnessing a firearm's recoil energy to allow it to continue firing after a single pull of the trigger, thereby transforming a semiautomatic weapon into a fully automatic machine gun. [...] For this reason, I will be introducing legislation that would include 'multi-burst trigger activators' to the list of offensive weapons under current law, including items such as binary triggers and slide fire/bump stocks like the one used in the Las Vegas shooting." Mackenzie voted against the bill, allowing it to die in the legislature without passage. [Pennsylvania House of Representatives, 12/12/22; 5/7/24]

2024: Mackenzie Voted Against HB 2206, Which Sought To "Require All Licensed Firearm Importers, Manufacturers, And Dealers To Submit Their Records Of Sale To The State Police Electronically." "To ensure that we are giving our officers every possible tool to keep us safe, we will be introducing legislation to require all licensed firearm importers, manufacturers, and dealers to submit their records of sale to the state police electronically, rather than by mail, unless there is a reported electronic failure, or the seller conducts 20 or fewer firearm transactions a year." Mackenzie voted against the bill, allowing it to die in the legislature without passage. [Pennsylvania House of Representatives, 3/27/24]

- 2023: Mackenzie voted against HB 1067, which would "allow non-U.S. citizens to teach in Pennsylvania" as long as they have experience, valid certification, immigration papers, and employment authorization.
- Mackenzie served on the Commission On Education And Economic Competitiveness.
- Mackenzie opposed a bill barring employers from checking applicants' credit scores during the hiring process.
- The Koch Brothers anti-union dark money group that backed the same GOP tax cuts that Mackenzie supported that would outsource Pennsylvania's manufacturing jobs supported Mackenzie's campaign.

# Mackenzie Opposed A Pennsylvania Constitutional Amendment To Guarantee The Right To Collective Bargaining

2023: Mackenzie Opposed HB 950, A Proposed Pennsylvania Constitutional Amendment To Guarantee The Right To Collective Bargaining. "Pennsylvania and 26 other states exempt non-represented workers from paying union dues, though House Bill 950 – if approved by voters – would amend the constitution to protect collective bargaining rights for wages, benefits, and other working conditions. Critics argue that doing so will give unions the power to charge workers 'nonmember fees' – superseding existing laws – and further weaken the state's strained labor force and drive economic investment elsewhere. And, that's even if the amendment makes it through both chambers of the Legislature twice – a feat Republicans deem impossible given their comfortable majority in the Senate. Minority Committee Chairman Rep. Ryan Mackenzie, R-Macungie, pointed to this dynamic as he lambasted his colleagues for setting aside issues with the state's unemployment benefits system and workforce development in favor of 'pandering to special interests.' 'We're ignoring those significant issues which are affecting workers across this commonwealth, totally ignoring them,' he said. 'Instead, we're passing these messaging bills ... but if we want to actually help workers, and on May Day again of all

days, we should not be giving false hope and false promises to individuals across this commonwealth that things are going to change." [The Center Square, 5/1/23]

#### Mackenzie Opposed A Bill To Give Workers On Strike Unemployment Benefits

Mackenzie Opposed A Bill To Give Workers On Strike Unemployment Benefits. "The Pennsylvania state House approved a bill Wednesday, Nov. 15, that would grant unemployment benefits to striking workers - a move Democrats said would level the playing field for employees, while Republicans said the measure would violate the intent of the benefit program. [...] Republicans said the proposal would violate the core concept of unemployment compensation, in which employees pay into a trust fund while they are working and receive pay from the fund when they find themselves involuntarily unemployed. 'When you choose to go on strike you are violating that premise, you are making that decision,' said Rep. Ryan Mackenzie, R- Lehigh County. While workers have a right to strike, 'what is not their right is to ask other hardworking Pennsylvanians to pay for them when they choose to go on strike,' Mackenzie said, and 'unless you come up with a way to actually pay for this, it's just a benefit drawdown for some workers that all workers end up paying for." #### Mackenzie Called A Bill To Prevent The Misclassification Of Contract Workers 'Problematic'

Mackenzie Called A Bill To Prevent The Misclassification Of Contract Workers 'Problematic.' "A bill cracking down on the misclassification of workers by construction contractors passed the Pennsylvania House on Monday, heading to the Senate where a slightly different bill on the same issue is already in the works. [...] Rep. Ryan Mackenzie, R-Lehigh County — the ranking Republican on the House labor committee — said the bill 'is still problematic' and that 'yet again we are heading down the path of offering a bill that is going to be dead when it goes over to the Senate,' given that other chamber has its own version. The bill in the GOP-controlled Senate, which passed out of committee with bipartisan support in October, has most of the same provisions as the House bill, with one crucial exception. The House version contains a provision extending debarments to 'successor entities,' intended to prevent the same operators from re-forming to skirt the ban. This is the provision at issue, according to Mackenzie, who said the definition is too broad and that 'businesses that are actually doing the right thing could get swept up in this legislation' due to the way the bill is worded." [...] It is my sincerely held belief that instituting treatment guidelines in our Workers' Compensation system will control costs and will enhance return-to-work outcomes for thousands of injured and disabled Pennsylvania workers. ### 2017: Mackenzie Introduced HB 18, Which Would Limit The Range Of Drugs Available To "Workers Injured On The Job"

**2017:** Mackenzie Was The Prime Sponsor Of HB 18 To Amend The Workers' Compensation Act. "An Act amending the act of June 2, 1915 (P.L.736, No.338), known as the Workers' Compensation Act, in liability and compensation, further providing for prescription drugs and the treatment of work-related injuries; and, in procedure, further providing for peer review." It would create a list of approved drugs, a set duration of treatment and establish dosage amounts for workers injured on the job. The bill would create a preapproved list, or 'formulary,' of opioids and other drugs for injured employees receiving medical care and financial assistance for lost wages under the Workers Compensation Act of 1915. ### Mackenzie Opposed Raising The Minimum Wage And Wage Reform On Numerous Occasions

2024: Mackenzie Opposed HB 2153, Which Would Strengthen Prevailing Wage Laws For Government Contractors. "State Rep. Ryan Mackenzie took a stand Monday against a bipartisan bill that would strengthen prevailing wage laws in Pennsylvania, arguing taxpayers would face artificially high costs as a result. House Bill 2153, introduced in March, would eliminate the practice of split rates. Currently, workers on government contracts performing two different roles on a project can be paid different rates for each role. As an example, a carpenter who also assists with manual labor wouldn't be allowed to be paid at a lower rate when when he's performing less skilled work. The bill would also require that prevailing wages are paid for employees doing prefabricated construction away from the community hosting the project. [...] Mackenzie argued the bill would pass along higher wage costs to taxpayers. Construction companies are increasingly turning to prefabricated construction methods to control expenses, but the bill would wipe out some of those gains, he said. At a time when housing is in greater demand, it would limit the government's ability to afford public housing, he said." [Lehigh Valley News, 6/3/24]

**2023: Mackenzie Voted Against HB 1500 To Amend The Minimum Wage Act.** "An Act amending the act of January 17, 1968 (P.L.11, No.5), known as The Minimum Wage Act of 1968, further providing for

2019: Mackenzie Praised A Pennsylvania Budget That Omitted A Minimum Wage Hike, Saying It Was "Fiscally Responsible." "The entire Lehigh Valley delegation voted in favor of the \$34 billion state budget, which was passed by the House of Representatives on Tuesday. 'This legislation represents a strong, fiscally responsible budget with no new taxes, investments in our key priorities, and saving for our future,' said State Rep. Ryan Mackenzie (R-Lehigh/ Berks). The budget, which does not call for any tax increases, did not include the minimum wage hike that Gov. Tom Wolf had been championing. The state minimum wage has been at \$7.25 per hour since 2009. Wolf has sought a gradual increase to \$12 an hour and then \$15 dollars per hour. The budget did dedicate more funding to public schools and career and technical education." Mackenzie Voted Against A Bill That Would Have Adopted Federal Occupational Safety And Health Administration Standards In Public Sector Workplaces, Where Worker Injury Rates Were Higher

Mackenzie Voted Against A Bill Which Would Have Adopted Federal Occupational Safety And Health Administration Standards In Public Sector Workplaces

Mackenzie Voted Against House Bill 299, Which Would Have The State Labor Department Adopt And Enforce Standards From The Federal Occupational Safety And Health Administration In Public Sector Workplaces. Mackenzie voted against House Bill 299 which, "This act shall be known and may be cited as the Public Employees Occupational Safety and Health Act. Section 2. Legislative declaration. The General Assembly hereby declares as follows: (1) It is a basic right of all employees to work in an environment that is free from hazards and risks to their safety. It is the intent of the General Assembly to ensure that this right is also afforded to employees of the Commonwealth, its counties, cities, towns, boroughs and townships and other public employers who serve the people of this Commonwealth. (2) A significant percentage of all of those employed in this Commonwealth are employed by the Commonwealth or by one of its political subdivisions. Many of these public employees perform job functions comparable to those performed by workers in the private sector who are protected by 29 U.S.C. Ch. 15 (relating 76ccupantional safety and health). The General Assembly, therefore, finds it inappropriate to continue two standards for employee safety, one applicable to those who work in the private sector and one for those who are employed by a public employer. (3) The General Assembly has further determined that a safe place in which to work is economically advantageous to employers. Workrelated accidents and injuries and the absences caused thereby decrease employee productivity and increase workers' compensation costs. In addition, unsafe premises increase the risk of financial liability for injuries to members of the public who frequent public buildings. (4) The General Assembly, in an

exercise of the Commonwealth's police power, charges the secretary with the responsibility to ensure that all public employees are afforded the same safeguards in their workplace as are granted to employees in the private sector." ### The Injury Rate For Pennsylvania Public Sector Employees Was At 4.6 Per 100 Workers, Compared To 2.8 Per 100 Workers In The Private Sector

Injury Rates For Pennsylvania Public Sector Employees Was At 4.6 Per 100 Workers, Compared To 2.8 Per 100 Workers In The Private Sector. "While data is spotty in Pennsylvania, national statistics do show a disparity in injury and illness rates between public and private sector workers. According to an AFL-CIO analysis of Bureau of Labor Statistics data, state and local public sector employers reported an injury rate of 4.6 per 100 workers in 2019, compared to a rate of just 2.8 per 100 workers in the private sector. 'We've seen a lot of injury rates among workers in local and state governments to be higher than those working in the private sectors,' said Tran Huynh, assistant professor of environmental and occupational health in Drexel's Dornsife School of Public Health." 
### Mackenzie Opposed A Bill Barring Employers From Checking Applicants' Credit Scores During The Hiring Process

Mackenzie Opposed HB 2207, Which Would Bar Employers From Checking Applicants' Credit Scores During The Hiring Process. "Pennsylvania may soon join the list of states banning employers from pulling job applicants' credit scores during the hiring process. The House Labor and Industry Committee recently approved House Bill 2207, which would outlaw the practice in most circumstances – except for jobs in finance or those subject to specific mandates by federal or local law. [...] Critics of the bill do not deny the potential problems with employer credit checks. Rather, they took issue with the bill itself, noting that by creating a broad exemption for work-related checks, the bill could prove to be ultimately ineffective legislation. 'My opinion is you could basically walk through that loophole,' said Rep Ryan Mackenzie, R-Macungie. 'If your goal is to actually protect individuals and not have this information asked because it's totally not job-related, I think there could be better ways to do that.'" 

"What happened to the workers in Clinton, tax experts say, will probably happen to more Americans if the Republican tax overhaul becomes law. The legislation fails to eliminate long-standing incentives for companies to move overseas and, in some cases, may even increase them, they say. 'This bill is potentially more dangerous than our current system,' said Stephen Shay, a senior lecturer at Harvard Law School and former Treasury Department international tax expert in the Obama administration. "In the future, corporations would be required to pay about a 10 percent minimum tax on overseas income above a certain level. The provision is billed as a way to discourage the movement of jobs and profit overseas. But the fine print of the new global minimum tax would make the problem worse, several tax specialists said. [...] First, a corporation would pay that global minimum tax only on profit above a 'routine' rate of return on the tangible assets such as factories it has overseas. So the more equipment a corporation has in other countries, the more tax-free income it can earn. Such allowances are normally fixed a couple of percentage points above risk-free Treasury yields, which are currently around 2.4 percent. As a result, a U.S. corporation that builds a \$100 million plant in another country and makes a foreign profit of \$20 million would pay roughly \$1 million in tax versus \$4 million on the same profit if earned in the United States, said Rosenthal, who has been a tax lawyer for 25 years and drafted tax legislation as a staffer for the Joint Committee on Taxation." "The act contains several provisions to reduce corporations' incentive to shift profits out of the United States. Two provisions—which impose a tax on global intangible low-tax income (GILTI) and create a deduction for foreign-derived intangible income (FDII)—reduce corporations' incentive to locate high-return assets (which are often intangible assets, such as intellectual property, or IP) in low-tax countries. The provisions reduce that incentive by applying special treatment to profits that exceed a specified return on tangible assets (such as equipment and structures). In addition to reducing profit shifting through the location of intangible assets, the GILTI and FDII provisions affect corporations' decisions about where to locate tangible assets. By locating more tangible assets abroad, a corporation is able to reduce the amount of foreign income that is categorized as GILTI. Similarly, by locating fewer tangible assets in the United States, a corporation can increase the amount of U.S. income that can be deducted as FDII. Together, the provisions may increase corporations' incentive to locate tangible assets abroad. (Like profit shifting, such decisions change the locations of reported profits—but they are not classified as profit shifting, because they involve actual economic activity rather than simply reporting.)" Mackenzie Said The Argument That Voted ID Laws Reduced Turnout Among Certain Groups Was A Lie. "Rep. Malcolm Kenyatta, D-Philadelphia, said Pennsylvania already has voter ID, in that identification is required for the first vote cast by a voter at a polling place. The proposed Republican changes would have voters present ID every time they vote. Kenyatta said the proposal does not give minority voters more confidence. He said voter ID requirements have 'been shown to make it more difficult' for certain groups to vote. He said any claim that says the changes create more confidence 'is not congruent with the facts.' A few minutes later, Republican Rep. Ryan Mackenzie of Lehigh County said there was a need to 'correct the record' on statements that voter ID reduced turnout among certain groups. 'Stop perpetuating this lie,' Mackenzie said. 'It is just not true.' Kenyatta later pointed out that a 'massive' election overhaul had already taken place - in 2019 - that did not include voter ID, and Kenyatta accused Mackenzie of lying. We authored legislation to make many changes that would have made elections more secure, but Wolf vetoed the bill because he objected to our inclusion of Voter ID requirements. 

### Mackenzie Signed An Amicus Brief For Texas v. Pennsylvania, Which Aimed To Overturn Pennsylvania's 2020 Election Results

A December 2020 Amicus Brief Argued That The Supreme Court Of Pennsylvania And The PA Secretary of State "Violated the Prerogative of the State Legislature to Make Election Policy as Prescribed Under the United States Constitution." "Under Article I, Section 4, Clause 1 of the United States Constitution state legislatures are given the singular authority to prescribe the times, places and manner of elections for federal office. Pursuant to that authority, the General Assembly of Pennsylvania, by statute, enacted and has from time to time amended the Commonwealth's Election Code which, in turn, details the times, places and manner of conducting elections within the Commonwealth. On September 17, 2020, subsequent to the last enacted amendment to the Elections Code, the Supreme Court of Pennsylvania issued an order changing the times, places and manner of our elections, effectively amending the Election Code by judicial fiat. On November 2, 2020 the office of the Secretary of the Commonwealth issued a directive to every county which effectively amended the Election Code by changing the manner of the conduct of elections. Both the decision of the Supreme Court of Pennsylvania and the directive of the Secretary of the Commonwealth violated the prerogative of the state legislature to make election policy as prescribed under the United States Constitution." 



Two provisions—which impose a tax on global intangible low-tax income (GILTI) and create a deduction for foreign-derived intangible income (FDII)—reduce corporations' incentive to locate high-return assets (which are often intangible assets, such as intellectual property, or IP) in low-tax countries. The provisions reduce that incentive by applying special treatment to profits that exceed a specified return on tangible assets (such as equipment and structures). In addition to reducing profit shifting through the location of intangible assets, the GILTI and FDII provisions affect corporations' decisions about where to locate tangible assets. By locating more tangible assets abroad, a corporation is able to reduce the amount of foreign income that is categorized as GILTI. Similarly, by locating fewer tangible assets in the United States, a corporation can increase the amount of U.S. income that can be deducted as FDII. Together, the provisions may increase corporations' incentive to locate tangible assets abroad. (Like profit shifting, such decisions change the locations of reported profits—but they are not classified as profit shifting, because they involve actual economic activity rather than simply reporting.)" (a) General rule. —For purposes of workers' compensation, unemployment compensation and improper classification of employees provided herein, an individual who performs services in the construction industry for remuneration is an independent contractor only if:(1) The individual has a written contract [to perform such services.] that is project-specific and contains a particular scope of work and definitive time period to perform the services. (2) The individual is free from control or direction over performance of such services both under the contract of service and in fact. (3) As to such services, the individual is customarily engaged in an independently established trade, occupation, profession or business." Workers' rights. Employees shall have the fundamental right to organize and to bargain collectively through representatives of their own choosing for the purpose of negotiating wages, hours and working conditions, and to protect their economic welfare and safety at work. No law shall be passed that interferes with, negates or diminishes the right of employees to organize and bargain collectively over their wages, hours and other terms and conditions of employment and work place safety, including any law or ordinance that prohibits the execution or application of agreements between employers and labor organizations that represent employees requiring membership in an organization as a condition of employment. Section 2. The following procedure applies to the proposed constitutional amendment in this joint resolution: (1) Upon the first passage by the General Assembly of the amendment, the Secretary of the Commonwealth shall proceed immediately to comply with the advertising requirements of section 1 of Article XI of the Constitution of Pennsylvania.(2) Upon the second passage by the General Assembly of the amendment, the Secretary of the Commonwealth shall proceed immediately to comply with the advertising requirements of section 1 of Article XI of the Constitution of Pennsylvania. The Secretary of the Commonwealth shall submit the amendment to the qualified electors of this Commonwealth at the first primary, general or municipal election which meets the requirements of section 1 of Article XI of the Constitution of Pennsylvania." Section 3. Independent contractors. (a) General rule. —For purposes of workers' compensation, unemployment compensation and improper classification of employees provided herein, an individual who performs services in the construction industry for remuneration is an independent contractor only if:(1) The individual has a written contract [to perform such services.] that is project-specific and contains a particular scope of work and definitive time period to perform the services. (2) The individual is free from control or direction over performance of such services both under the contract of service and in fact. (3) As to such services, the individual is customarily engaged in an independently established trade, occupation, profession or business." [...] It is my sincerely held belief that instituting treatment guidelines in our Workers' Compensation system will control costs and will enhance return-to-work outcomes for thousands of injured and disabled Pennsylvania workers. - A Workers' Compensation Attorney Argued That If Mackenzie's Bill Was Passed, "Any Remaining Compassion" For Injured Workers "Will Be Eradicated." [...] In practice, treatment guidelines will reduce injured workers' injuries and conditions to statistics to be manipulated and handled according to data charts and tables of 'most efficient' practices, removing a treating doctor's judgment altogether. Clients too often struggle to prove their injuries and receive the

"The 'one size fits all' approach to an injured worker places them at risk of losing individualized treatment and therapy for their specific injury, which would have a higher likelihood of reducing disability. [...] The application of rote evidence-based guidelines on treatment may reduce the number of medical providers willing to accept workers' compensation patients for treatment, which will in turn restrict access to medical care for those injured workers. [...] H.B. 1800 may include an unconstitutional delegation of legislative authority to a 'panel of medical providers.' [...] This appointment diminishes the judicial autonomy of the Workers' Compensation Judge. A claimant is not precluded from collecting both total or partial disability benefits and a disfigurement benefit simultaneously." 



"The act contains several provisions to reduce corporations' incentive to shift profits out of the United States. Two provisions—which impose a tax on global intangible low-tax income (GILTI) and create a deduction for foreign-derived intangible income (FDII)—reduce corporations' incentive to locate high-return assets (which are often intangible assets, such as intellectual property, or IP) in low-tax countries. The provisions reduce that incentive by applying special treatment to profits that exceed a specified return on tangible assets (such as equipment and structures). In addition to reducing profit shifting through the location of intangible assets, the GILTI and FDII provisions affect corporations' decisions about where to locate tangible assets. By locating more tangible assets abroad, a corporation is able to reduce the amount of foreign income that is categorized as GILTI. Similarly, by locating fewer tangible assets in the United States, a corporation can increase the amount of U.S. income that can be deducted as FDII. Together, the provisions may increase corporations' incentive to locate tangible assets abroad. (Like profit shifting, such decisions change the locations of reported profits—but they are not classified as profit shifting, because they involve actual economic activity rather than simply reporting.)" 
