Begich Argued It Was Important To "Support Crisis Pregnancy Centers." "What specific national policies would you support to help protect unborn babies from abortion? BEGICH: Following the Supreme Court's decision in Dobbs, the issue of abortion has been returned to the states. However, certain national policy continues to be relevant. For example, the Hyde Amendment is longstanding federal policy that ensures federal dollars are not used to fund abortion. I support this amendment, particularly in light of the Supreme Court's decision under Dobbs. Under the post-Dobbs framework, it's important that we promote national policies that will accelerate adoption processes, support crisis pregnancy centers which provide important information to those considering abortion, and implement parental notification when minors are attempting to obtain an abortion. It's critical that people stay engaged on this important issue and ensure that candidates, ready and willing to implement commonsense policies that protect human

rights at each stage of human development, are elected to legislative positions in state government." [Alaska Watchman, 6/12/24]

Begich Opposed "The Use Of Military Funds To Transport Soldiers To Obtain An Abortion." "Do you support the use of military funds to transport soldiers to obtain an abortion? BEGICH: No." [Alaska Watchman, 6/12/24]

Begich Promoted "Information Regarding The Potential For Mifepristone Reversal." "Do you support the Biden Administration's decision to allow pharmacies to distribute the abortion drug Mifepristone? BEGICH: No. As has been done across government and throughout Biden's executive tenure, the Biden Administration has greatly exceeded its authority to unilaterally act in this matter. Biden's direct involvement in pharmaceutical policy circumvents the delegated authority that Congress has provided to the FDA. These matters are now before the courts. Begich "Celebrated The U.S. Supreme Court's Decision" Overturning Roe V. Wade And Said The Supreme Court Was "Correct" In Doing So. "Both Begich and Palin celebrated the U.S. Supreme Court's decision, handed down on Friday, that reversed federal protections for abortion access guaranteed in the 1973 Roe v. Wade decision. [...] Alaska's constitution still guarantees abortions will remain accessible in the state, and previous surveys have indicated that a majority of Alaskans support abortion access. 'I think the court was correct in returning this issue to the states and here in the state of Alaska. ... it will now become a discussion for our state Legislature,' Begich said." - American Bar Association: "Abortion Bans Are Forcing Medical Professionals To Deviate From The Standard Of Care." "Preliminary results of a study by researchers at Advancing New Standards in Reproductive Health (ANSIRH) contain stories from medical providers offering obstetric and gynecologic care post-Dobbs, showing that abortion bans are forcing medical professionals to deviate from the standard of care and leading to delays in care and adverse health outcomes. A joint study by Physicians for Human Rights, the Center for Reproductive Rights, and Oklahoma Call for Reproductive Justice found widespread confusion about Oklahoma's abortion laws at hospitals throughout the state, showing how near-total abortion bans fuel confusion about clinicians' ability to provide care during obstetric emergencies, with risk to the lives, health, and safety of pregnant people. - Dobbs Decisions Counters Human Rights And World Health Organization Guidance. "Over the past 25 years, international human rights experts and mechanisms have recognized that restrictive abortion laws violate human rights, including rights to life, privacy, health, equality and non-discrimination, and freedom from cruel, inhumane, and degrading treatment. Many of these protections are contained in treaties ratified by the United States. For example, the International

Covenant on Civil and Political Rights, ratified by the United States in 1992, protects the right to life, which limits the restrictions that states can place on abortion access and obligates governments to ensure access to abortion services. United Nations (UN) human rights experts explained the full scope of human rights protections for abortion access in an amicus brief filed in Dobbs. • Women Of Color Are More Likely To Face Aggressive Abortion Restrictions. "About six in ten Black (60%) and AIAN (59%) women ages 18-49 living in states with abortion bans or restrictions compared with just over half (53%) of White, less than half of Hispanic (45%), and about three in ten Asian (28%) and Native Hawaiian or Pacific Islander (NHPI) (29%) women ages 18-49. [...] Among women ages 18-49, roughly a fifth of AIAN (22%) and Hispanic (21%) women are uninsured as are 14% of NHPI women and 11% of Black women compared with less than one in ten (7%) of White women. Moreover, uninsured rates for women ages 18-49 are at least twice as high in states that banned abortion compared to those in states with broader access for White (10% vs. 5%), Hispanic (33% vs. 15%), Black (14% vs. 7%), and Asian (10% vs. 5%) women, and nearly three times higher for NHPI women (29% vs. 10%)." Begich Was Opposed To Making Mifepristone Available In Pharmacies. "Begich has said he is opposed to making mifepristone, a drug used in medication abortions, available at pharmacies." [Anchorage Daily News, 8/11/24]

The FDA's REMS Restrictions On Mifepristone That Kept The Drug Out Of Pharmacies Were "Not Supported By Research" And "Only Make Things Harder For Patients." "Currently in the United States, patients cannot access mifepristone through a pharmacy. It remains out of reach for many people across the country, particularly those living in remote or rural areas, due to the FDA's Risk Evaluation and Mitigation Strategy (REMS) restrictions. The REMS restrictions on mifepristone are not supported by research and create medically unnecessary barriers for patients accessing both medication abortion and the best method of managing a miscarriage.[...]The REMS restrictions on mifepristone are not supported by research and are yet another example of reproductive health care — especially abortion — being treated differently than other kinds of health care in ways that only make things harder for patients.[Planned Parenthood, 1/1/19]

The FDA Imposed "Medically Unnecessary Restrictions" On Mifepristone, A Drug Safer Than Tylenol. "Study after study has shown the exceeding safety and efficacy of mifepristone for use in abortion and miscarriage care. In fact, mifepristone is safer than Tylenol and Viagra when it comes to serious medical complications[...]Despite its approval and long safety track record, the FDA has continued to impose a set of medically unnecessary restrictions on mifepristone, known as a Risk Evaluation and Mitigation Strategy (REMS), which has made it needlessly difficult for women and other people who need abortion care to access the medication. 2021: Jim Jordan, Scott Perry, And Byron Donalds Cosponsored H.R. 1011, The Life At Conception Act. According to the Clerk of the House of Representatives, Jordan and Perry Cosponsored the Life at Conception Act, which stated "This bill declares that the right to life guaranteed by the Constitution is vested in each human being at all stages of life, including the moment of fertilization,

cloning, or other moment at which an individual comes into being." [Clerk of the U.S. House of Representatives, H.R. 1011, 2/11/21]

- The Life At Conception Act Was A National Abortion Ban That Made No Exceptions For Rape Or Incest. "The Life at Conception Act would ban abortion from conception with zero exceptions for rape or incest. This would include banning the abortion pill, a medication that was approved by the US Food and Drug Administration (FDA) back in 2000 and is currently used in approximately 60% of abortions nationwide." - 2021: The Life At Conception Act Threatened IVF. "The [2021] Life at Conception Act would have established that life begins at fertilization. Like the Alabama ruling, the act would have severely restricted—if not effectively banned—IVF treatments, because it grants 'equal protection' to 'preborn' humans, including embryos. Since it's common for fertilized eggs not to survive the IVF process, the act would put doctors at risk of being charged for wrongful death of embryos. That risk would be enough to scupper the IVF industry." [The New Republic, 3/21/24]
- The 2017 Version Of The Life At Conception Act Made Exceptions For IVF; Subsequent Versions Of The Bill Excluded It. "In the [118th] Congress, a Life at Conception Act has 125 Republican sponsors in the House. Its stated goal is "To implement equal protection for the right to life of each born and preborn human person[...]There's no wiggle room there, folks. No exceptions for rape, incest, health of the mother or IVF. But now they're protesting that they didn't mean to endanger IVF, even though a 2017 version of the same bill did include an IVF exception that was omitted in the current bill. - The Life At Conception Act Of 2021 Copied The 2017 Version Word For Word But Excluded Protections For Birth Control And IVF. The Life At Conception Act of 2017 as introduced on January 24, 2017: "To implement equal protection for the right to life of each born and preborn human person, and pursuant to the duty and authority of Congress, including Congress' power under section 8 of article I of the Constitution of the United States to make necessary and proper laws, and Congress's power under section 5 of the 14th Amendment to the Constitution, the Congress hereby declares that the right to life guaranteed by the Constitution is vested in each human being. Nothing in this Act shall be construed to require the prosecution of any woman for the death of her unborn child, a prohibition on in vitro fertilization, or a prohibition on use of birth control or another means of preventing fertilization." The Life At Conception Act as introduced on February 11, 2021: "To implement equal protection for the right to life of each born and preborn human person, and pursuant to the duty and authority of the Congress, including Congress' power under article I, section 8, to make necessary and proper laws, and Congress's power under section 5 of the 14th article of amendment to the Constitution of the United States, the Congress hereby declares that the right to life guaranteed by the Constitution is vested in each human being. However, nothing in this Act shall be construed to authorize the prosecution of any woman for the death of her unborn child." 2022: Byron Donalds, Scott Perry, And Jim Jordan Voted Against The Women's Health Protection Act. According to records with the Clerk of the U.S. House of Representatives, Donalds, Perry, and Jordan all voted against the Women's Health Protection Act, which had the following bill summary: This bill prohibits governmental restrictions on the provision of, and access to, abortion services. Specifically, governments may not limit a provider's ability to: prescribe certain drugs, offer abortion services via telemedicine, or immediately provide abortion services when the provider determines a delay risks the

patient's health. Furthermore, governments may not require a provider to: perform unnecessary medical procedures, or provide medically inaccurate information." [Clerk of the U.S. House of Representatives, H.R. 8296, 7/7/22; Roll Call No. 360, 7/15/22]

2012: Jim Jordan Sponsored The Ultrasound Informed Consent Act, Which Would Require Health Providers To Give Women An Ultrasound Before Providing Abortion Services. According to the Clerk of the U.S. House of Representatives, Jim Jordan sponsored the Ultrasound Informed Consent Act, which had the following bill summary: "Amends the Public Health Service Act to require abortion providers, before a woman gives informed consent to any part of an abortion, to perform an obstetric ultrasound on the pregnant woman, provide a simultaneous explanation of what the ultrasound is depicting, display the ultrasound images so the woman may view them, and provide a complete medical description of the images, including the dimensions of the embryo or fetus, cardiac activity if present and visible, and the presence of external members and internal organs if present and viewable. Prohibits construing this Act to require a woman to view the images or penalizing the provider or the woman if she declines to look at the images. Exempts an abortion provider if the abortion is necessary to save the life of a mother whose life is endangered by a physical disorder, physical illness, or physical injury, including a life-endangering physical condition caused by or arising from the pregnancy itself. Requires the provider to include in the woman's medical file a truthful and accurate certification of the specific medical circumstances that support such determination. Authorizes the Attorney General to commence a civil action in federal court against any abortion provider who knowingly violates this Act. Prescribes penalties. Directs the Attorney General to notify the appropriate state medical licensing authority of penalties assessed. Authorizes a woman upon whom an abortion has been performed in violation of this Act to commence a civil action against the provider for actual and punitive damages." Ultrasound Informed Consent Acts Only Allow Women To Cover Their Eyes Or Close Their Ears During A Narration Of Their Ultrasound- They Cannot Opt Out. "The Kentucky statute compels any doctor performing an abortion to first do an ultrasound on the patient and describe aloud the physical features of the fetus on the screen. The doctor must also play the sound of the fetal heartbeat. Patients cannot opt out of hearing the doctor's narration or the heartbeat. They cannot ask that the screen be turned away from them. The only way a patient has to avoid the ultrasound images or narration is to cover her ears and close her eyes while the physician speaks. [Los Angeles Times, 12/11/19]

Jim Jordan (R-OH) refused to apologize for his since-deleted tweet describing the story of a 10-year-old Ohio rape victim as a"lie," claiming on Thursday that he was merely "responding to a headline" and took down the post once the alleged rapist was charged. The story of the unidentified child's rape and abortion had quickly become a flashpoint in the debate over abortion rights after the Indianapolis Star reported on her plight on July 1. The patient was six weeks and three days pregnant, right after Ohio's trigger law outlawed abortion after six weeks following Roe v. Wade's reversal." [Daily Beast, 7/14/22]



The Chevron Doctrine "Made It Easier For The Federal Government To Regulate The Environment, Public Health, Workplace Safety And Consumer Protections." "The Supreme Court on Friday upended a 40-year-old decision that made it easier for the federal government to regulate the environment, public health, workplace safety and consumer protections, delivering a far-reaching and potentially lucrative victory to business interests. The court's six conservative justices overturned the 1984 decision colloquially known as Chevron, long a target of conservatives who have been motivated as much by weakening the regulatory state as social issues including abortion. The Chevron Decision Allowed The Maintenance Of A "Rule That Herring Fishermen Pay For Government-Mandated Observers Who Track Their Fish Intake," Which Led To The Lawsuit That Overturned It. "The heart of the Chevron decision says federal agencies should be allowed to fill in the details when laws aren't crystal clear. Opponents of the decision argued that it gave power that should be wielded by judges to experts who work for the government. [...] The court ruled in cases brought by Atlantic herring fishermen in New Jersey and Rhode Island who challenged a fee requirement. Lower courts used the Chevron decision to uphold a 2020 National Marine Fisheries Service rule that herring fishermen pay for government-mandated observers who track their fish intake. [...] Gun, e-cigarette, farm, timber and home-building groups were among the business groups supporting the fishermen. Conservative interests that also intervened in recent high court cases limiting regulation of air and water pollution backed the fishermen as well. The fisherman sued to contest the 2020 regulation that would have authorized a fee that could have topped \$700 a day, though no one ever had to pay it. In separate lawsuits in New Jersey and Rhode Island, the fishermen argued that Congress never gave federal regulators authority to require the fisherman to pay for monitors. They lost in the lower courts, which relied on the Chevron decision to sustain the regulation." [Associated Press, 6/28/24]

The Nature Conservancy Claimed That The Supreme Court's Overturn Of The Chevron Doctrine Would Present Challenges To Preserving The Planet. "The decisions are likely to present challenges to preserving the many decades of progress we have made in protecting people and the planet. They affect the requirement articulated by the Supreme Court 40 years ago for federal courts to give deference to reasonable determinations by a federal agency on how best to interpret, implement and enforce provisions of federal laws that agencies are charged by Congress to implement. That is concerning, given the high level of scientific and other relevant expertise, as well as practical experience, there is among the people who work in our federal agencies. It is exactly this kind of expertise and experience we need if we want to successfully implement laws enacted by Congress, particularly since the laws often deal with complex and ambiguous issues that require the development of detailed regulations that are open for public comment." The Decision Overturning Chevron Regarded "Petitioners To A Rule Promulgated By The National Marine Fisheries Service" And Involved At Least Two Trawler Operators. "The Court granted certiorari in these cases limited to the question whether Chevron U. S. A. Inc. v. Natural Resources Defense Council, Inc., 467 U. S. 837, should be overruled or clarified. Under the Chevron doctrine, courts have sometimes been required to defer to 'permissible' agency interpretations of the statutes those agencies administer—even when a reviewing court reads the statute differently. Id., at 843. In each case below, the reviewing courts applied Chevron's framework to resolve in favor of the Government challenges by petitioners to a rule promulgated by the National Marine Fisheries Service pursuant to the Magnuson-Stevens Act, 16 U. S. C. §1801 et seq., which incorporates the Administrative Procedure Act (APA), 5 U. S. C. §551 et seq. [...] Petitioners Loper Bright Enterprises, Inc., H&L Axelsson, Inc., Lund Marr Trawlers LLC, and Scombrus One LLC are family businesses that operate in the Atlantic herring fishery. In February 2020, they challenged the Rule under the MSA, 16 U. S. C. §1855(f), which incorporates the Administrative Procedure Act (APA), 5 U. S. C. §551 et seq. In relevant part, they argued that the MSA does not authorize NMFS to mandate that they pay for observers required by a fishery management plan. [...] Petitioners Relentless Inc., Huntress Inc., and Seafreeze Fleet LLC own two vessels that operate in the Atlantic herring fishery: the F/V Relentless and the F/V Persistence. These vessels use small-mesh bottom-trawl gear and can freeze fish at sea, so they can catch more species of fish and take longer trips than other vessels (about 10 to 14 days, as opposed to the more typical 2 to 4). As a result, they generally declare into multiple fisheries per trip so they can catch whatever the ocean

offers up. If the vessels declare into the Atlantic herring fishery for a particular trip, they must carry an observer for that trip if NMFS selects the trip for coverage, even if they end up harvesting fewer herring than other vessels—or no herring at all." The IRA "provides \$3.3 billion for NOAA to build on its commitment to help Americans - including tribes and vulnerable populations - prepare, adapt, and build resilience to weather and climate events; improve supercomputing capacity and research on weather, oceans, and climate; strengthen NOAA's hurricane hunter aircraft and fleet; and replace aging NOAA facilities." The Inflation Reduction Act Offered \$1 Billion In Grants To Develop Clean Heavy-Duty Vehicles. The IRA provided "funding to help Tribal, state, and local governments and other entities offset the cost of replacing heavy-duty Class 6 and 7 commercial vehicles with zero-emission vehicles, deploy supporting infrastructure, and train and develop the necessary workforce. At least \$400 million must go to areas not meeting national air quality standards." [EPA, 7/20/24]

The Inflation Reduction Act Offered Approximately \$2 Billion In Grants For The Environmental And Climate Justice Community Change Program. The IRA "will invest approximately \$2 billion dollars in Inflation Reduction Act funds in environmental and climate justice activities to benefit disadvantaged communities." [EPA, 7/20/24]

The Inflation Reduction Act Allocated \$6.2 Billion To The Department Of The Interior To 'Tackle The Climate Crisis.' According to the U.S. Department of the Interior's website, the IRA provided the department "\$6.2 billion, enabling our bureaus and offices to play a leading role in advancing key habitat restoration, land resilience and water projects, and securing environmental justice for historically disadvantaged communities." This included: \$4.6 Billion to "advance system conservation and mitigate drought impacts," \$700 million to "advance conservation, restoration and resilience activities on our public lands," \$500 million to "support additional staffing at the National Park Service," and \$425 million to "support communities prepare for and adapt to worsening threats brought on by the climate crisis." The Inflation Reduction Act Provided Funding For USDA Rural Development. According to the USDA, the Inflation Reduction Act "provides funding to USDA Rural Development to help eligible entities purchase renewable energy and zero-emission systems and make energy-efficiency improvements that will significantly reduce greenhouse gas emissions." This included "Up to \$1 billion for RUS loans for renewable energy infrastructure. The Act requires the agency to forgive up to 50% of the loan amount. Eligible entities include electric service providers, including municipals, cooperatives, investor-owned and Tribal utilities. [...] Up to \$2.025 billion for the RBCS Rural Energy for America Program (REAP), with \$303 million set aside for underutilized technologies and technical assistance. This includes installing, retrofitting or upgrading dispensers for ethanol at retail stations

as well as home heating oil distribution centers. [...] Up to \$9.7 billion for RUS to offer loans, grants, loan modifications and other financial assistance to support the purchase of renewable energy systems, zero-emission systems and carbon capture systems. The Inflation Reduction Act Provided \$100 Million For Environmental Review Implementation For Surface Transportation Projects. 



Jordan, Perry, And Donalds Cosponsored The Life At Conception Bill Of 2021, Which Had No Exceptions For Rape Or Incest And Deliberately Excluded Protections For IVF And Birth Control

2021: Jordan, Perry, And Donalds Cosponsored H.R. 1011, The Life At Conception Act. According to the Clerk of the House of Representatives, Jordan and Perry Cosponsored the Life at Conception Act, which stated "This bill declares that the right to life guaranteed by the Constitution is vested in each human being at all stages of life, including the moment of fertilization, cloning, or other moment at which an individual comes into being." The Life At Conception Act Was A National Abortion Ban That Made No Exceptions For Rape Or Incest. "The Life at Conception Act would ban abortion from conception with zero exceptions for rape or incest. This would include banning the abortion pill, a medication that was approved by the US Food and Drug Administration (FDA) back in 2000 and is currently used in approximately 60% of abortions nationwide." The Life At Conception Act Threatened IVF. "The Life at Conception Act would have established that life begins at fertilization. Nothing in this Act shall be construed to require the prosecution of any woman for the death of her unborn child, a prohibition on in vitro fertilization, or a prohibition on use of birth control or another means of preventing fertilization." The Life At Conception Act as introduced on February 11, 2021: "To implement equal protection for the right to life of each born and preborn human person, and pursuant to the duty and authority of the Congress, including Congress' power under article I, section 8, to make necessary and proper laws, and Congress's power under section 5 of the 14th article of amendment to the Constitution of the United States, the Congress hereby declares that the right to life guaranteed by the Constitution is vested in each human being. However, nothing in this Act shall be construed to authorize the prosecution of any woman for the death of her unborn child." [Clerk of the U.S. House of Representatives, HR 1011, 2/11/21; S. 231, 1/24/17

Donalds, Perry, And Jordan Voted Against The Women's Health Protection Act. According to records with the Clerk of the U.S. House of Representatives, Donalds, Perry, and Jordan all voted against the Women's Health Protection Act, which had the following bill summary: This bill prohibits governmental restrictions on the provision of, and access to, abortion services. Specifically, governments may not limit a provider's ability to: prescribe certain drugs, offer abortion services via telemedicine, or immediately provide abortion services when the provider determines a delay risks the patient's health. Furthermore, governments may not require a provider to: perform unnecessary medical procedures, or provide medically inaccurate information." Jordan Sponsored The Ultrasound Informed Consent Act, Which Would Require Health Providers To Give Women An Ultrasound Before Providing Abortion Services. According to the Clerk of the U.S. House of Representatives, Jim Jordan sponsored the Ultrasound Informed Consent Act, which had the following bill summary: "Amends the Public Health Service Act to require abortion providers, before a woman gives informed consent to any part of an abortion, to perform an obstetric ultrasound on the pregnant woman, provide a simultaneous explanation of what the ultrasound is depicting, display the ultrasound images so the woman may view them, and provide a complete medical description of the images, including the dimensions of the embryo or fetus, cardiac activity if present and visible, and the presence of external members and internal organs if present and viewable. Prohibits construing this Act to require a woman to view the images or penalizing the provider or the woman if she declines to look at the images. Exempts an abortion provider if the abortion is necessary to save the life of a mother whose life is endangered by a physical disorder, physical illness, or physical injury, including a life-endangering physical condition caused by or arising from the pregnancy itself. Requires the provider to include in the woman's medical file a truthful and accurate certification of the specific medical circumstances that support such determination. Authorizes the Attorney General to commence a civil action in federal court against any abortion provider who knowingly violates this Act. Prescribes penalties. Directs the Attorney General to notify the appropriate state medical licensing authority of penalties assessed. Authorizes a woman upon whom an abortion has been performed in violation of this Act to commence a civil action against the provider for actual and punitive damages." [Clerk of the U.S. House of Representatives, H.R. 3805, 1/23/12]

Ultrasound Informed Consent Acts Only Allow Women To Cover Their Eyes Or Close Their Ears During A Narration Of Their Ultrasound- They Cannot Opt Out. "The Kentucky statute compels any doctor performing an abortion to first do an ultrasound on the patient and describe aloud the physical features of the fetus on the screen. The doctor must also play the sound of the fetal heartbeat. Patients cannot opt out of hearing the doctor's narration or the heartbeat. They cannot ask that the screen be turned away from them. The only way a patient has to avoid the ultrasound images or narration is to cover her ears and close her eyes while the physician speaks. [Los Angeles Times, 12/11/19]

By law, the salmon must be returned to the ocean, but fish die in the process. 



"The Court granted certiorari in these cases limited to the question whether Chevron U. S. A. Inc. v. Natural Resources Defense Council, Inc., 467 U. S. 837, should be overruled or clarified. Under the Chevron doctrine, courts have sometimes been required to defer to 'permissible' agency interpretations of the statutes those agencies administer—even when a reviewing court reads the statute differently. Id., at 843. In each case below, the reviewing courts applied Chevron's framework to resolve in favor of the Government challenges by petitioners to a rule promulgated by the National Marine Fisheries Service pursuant to the Magnuson-Stevens Act, 16 U. S. C. §1801 et seq., which incorporates the Administrative Procedure Act (APA), 5 U. S. C. §551 et seq. [...] Petitioners Loper Bright Enterprises, Inc., H&L Axelsson, Inc., Lund Marr Trawlers LLC, and Scombrus One LLC are family businesses that operate in the Atlantic herring fishery. In February 2020, they challenged the Rule under the MSA, 16 U. S. C. §1855(f), which incorporates the Administrative Procedure Act (APA), 5 U. S. C. §551 et seq. In relevant part, they argued that the MSA does not authorize NMFS to mandate that they pay for observers required by a fishery management plan. [...] Petitioners Relentless Inc., Huntress Inc., and Seafreeze Fleet LLC own two vessels that operate in the Atlantic herring fishery: the F/V Relentless and the F/V Persistence. These vessels use small-mesh bottom-trawl gear and can freeze fish at sea, so they can catch more species of fish and take longer trips than other vessels (about 10 to 14 days, as opposed to the more typical 2 to 4). As a result, they generally declare into multiple fisheries per trip so they can catch whatever the ocean offers up. If the vessels declare into the Atlantic herring fishery for a particular trip, they must carry an observer for that trip if NMFS selects the trip for coverage, even if they end up harvesting fewer herring than other vessels—or no herring at all." The Chevron Doctrine "Made It Easier For The Federal Government To Regulate The Environment, Public Health, Workplace Safety And Consumer Protections"

The Chevron Doctrine "Made It Easier For The Federal Government To Regulate The Environment, Public Health, Workplace Safety And Consumer Protections." "The Supreme Court on Friday upended a 40-year-old decision that made it easier for the federal government to regulate the environment, public health, workplace safety and consumer protections, delivering a far-reaching and potentially lucrative victory to business interests. The court's six conservative justices overturned the 1984 decision colloquially known as Chevron, long a target of conservatives who have been motivated as much by weakening the regulatory state as social issues including abortion. The liberal justices were in dissent." [Associated Press, 6/28/24]

The Chevron Decision Allowed The Maintenance Of A "Rule That Herring Fishermen Pay For Government-Mandated Observers Who Track Their Fish Intake," Which Led To The Lawsuit That Overturned It. "The heart of the Chevron decision says federal agencies should be allowed to fill in the details when laws aren't crystal clear. Opponents of the decision argued that it gave power that should be wielded by judges to experts who work for the government. [...] The court ruled in cases brought by Atlantic herring fishermen in New Jersey and Rhode Island who challenged a fee requirement. Lower courts used the Chevron decision to uphold a 2020 National Marine Fisheries Service rule that herring fishermen pay for government-mandated observers who track their fish intake. [...] Gun, e-cigarette, farm, timber and home-building groups were among the business groups supporting the fishermen. Conservative interests that also intervened in recent high court cases limiting regulation of air and water pollution backed the fishermen as well. The fisherman sued to contest the 2020 regulation that would have authorized a fee that could have topped \$700 a day, though no one ever had to pay it. In separate lawsuits in New Jersey and Rhode Island, the fishermen argued that Congress never gave federal regulators authority to require the fisherman to pay for monitors. They lost in the lower courts, which relied on the Chevron decision to sustain the regulation." [Associated Press, 6/28/24]

"Medicaid is an important source of coverage for American Indians and Alaska Natives (AI/ANs), a population that faces high unemployment and persistent health disparities, including a high uninsured rate, barriers to care, and significant physical and mental health needs. 

The Decision Overturning Chevron Regarded 'Petitioners To A Rule Promulgated By The National Marine Fisheries Service' And Involved At Least Two Trawler Operators. "The Court granted certiorari in these cases limited to the question whether Chevron U. S. A. Inc. v. Natural Resources Defense Council, Inc., 467 U. S. 837, should be overruled or clarified. Under the Chevron doctrine, courts have sometimes been required to defer to 'permissible' agency interpretations of the statutes those agencies administer—even when a reviewing court reads the statute differently. Id., at 843. In each case below, the reviewing courts applied Chevron's framework to resolve in favor of the Government challenges by petitioners to a rule promulgated by the National Marine Fisheries Service pursuant to the Magnuson-Stevens Act, 16 U. S. C. §1801 et seq., which incorporates the Administrative Procedure Act (APA), 5 U. S. C. §551 et seq. [...] Petitioners Loper Bright Enterprises, Inc., H&L Axelsson, Inc., Lund Marr Trawlers LLC, and Scombrus One LLC are family businesses that operate in the Atlantic herring fishery. In February 2020, they challenged the Rule under the MSA, 16 U. S. C. §1855(f), which incorporates the Administrative Procedure Act (APA), 5 U. S. C. §551 et seq. In relevant part, they argued that the MSA does not authorize NMFS to mandate that they pay for observers required by a fishery management plan. [...] Petitioners Relentless Inc., Huntress Inc., and Seafreeze Fleet LLC own two vessels that operate in the Atlantic herring fishery: the F/V Relentless and the F/V Persistence. These vessels use small-mesh bottom-trawl gear and can freeze fish at sea, so they can catch more species of fish and take longer trips than other vessels (about 10 to 14 days, as opposed to the more typical 2 to 4). As a result, they generally declare into multiple fisheries per trip so they can catch whatever the ocean offers up. If the vessels declare into the Atlantic herring fishery for a particular trip, they must carry an observer for that trip if NMFS selects the trip for coverage, even if they end up harvesting fewer herring than other vessels—or no herring at all." The Chevron Doctrine "Made It Easier For The Federal Government To Regulate The Environment, Public Health, Workplace Safety And Consumer Protections"

The Chevron Doctrine "Made It Easier For The Federal Government To Regulate The Environment, Public Health, Workplace Safety And Consumer Protections." "The Supreme Court on Friday upended a 40-year-old decision that made it easier for the federal government to regulate the environment, public health, workplace safety and consumer protections, delivering a far-reaching and potentially lucrative victory to business interests. The court's six conservative justices overturned the 1984 decision colloquially known as Chevron, long a target of conservatives who have been motivated as much by weakening the regulatory state as social issues including abortion. The liberal justices were in dissent." [Associated Press, 6/28/24]

The Chevron Decision Allowed The Maintenance Of A "Rule That Herring Fishermen Pay For Government-Mandated Observers Who Track Their Fish Intake," Which Led To The Lawsuit That Overturned It. "The heart of the Chevron decision says federal agencies should be allowed to fill in the details when laws aren't crystal clear. Opponents of the decision argued that it gave power that should be wielded by judges to experts who work for the government. [...] The court ruled in cases brought by Atlantic herring fishermen in New Jersey and Rhode Island who challenged a fee requirement. Lower courts used the Chevron decision to uphold a 2020 National Marine Fisheries Service rule that herring fishermen pay for government-mandated observers who track their fish intake. [...] Gun, e-cigarette, farm, timber and home-building groups were among the business groups supporting the fishermen. Conservative interests that also intervened in recent high court cases limiting regulation of air and water pollution backed the fishermen as well. The fisherman sued to contest the 2020 regulation that would have authorized a fee that could have topped \$700 a day, though no one ever had to pay it. In separate lawsuits in New Jersey and Rhode Island, the fishermen argued that Congress never gave federal regulators authority to require the fisherman to pay for monitors. They lost in the lower courts, which relied on the Chevron decision to sustain the regulation." [Associated Press, 6/28/24]

The Nature Conservancy Claimed That The Supreme Court's Overturn Of The Chevron Doctrine Would Present Challenges To Preserving The Planet. "The decisions are likely to present challenges to preserving the many decades of progress we have made in protecting people and the planet. They affect the requirement articulated by the Supreme Court 40 years ago for federal courts to give deference to reasonable determinations by a federal agency on how best to interpret, implement and enforce provisions of federal laws that agencies are charged by Congress to implement. That is concerning, given the high level of scientific and other relevant expertise, as well as practical experience, there is among the people who work in our federal agencies. It is exactly this kind of expertise and experience we need if we want to successfully implement laws enacted by Congress, particularly since the laws often deal with complex and ambiguous issues that require the development of detailed regulations that are open for public comment." The Inflation Reduction Act Provided \$3.3 Billion To NOAA To "Build A Climate-Ready Nation." The IRA "provides \$3.3 billion for NOAA to build on its commitment to help Americans - including tribes and vulnerable populations - prepare, adapt, and build resilience to weather and climate events; improve supercomputing capacity and research on weather, oceans, and climate; strengthen NOAA's hurricane hunter aircraft and fleet; and replace aging NOAA facilities." [NOAA, Accessed 7/20/24]

The Inflation Reduction Act Offered \$1 Billion In Grants To Develop Clean Heavy-Duty Vehicles. The IRA provided "funding to help Tribal, state, and local governments and other entities offset the cost of replacing heavy-duty Class 6 and 7 commercial vehicles with zero-emission vehicles, deploy supporting infrastructure, and train and develop the necessary workforce. At least \$400 million must go to areas not meeting national air quality standards." [EPA, 7/20/24]

The Inflation Reduction Act Offered Approximately \$2 Billion In Grants For The Environmental And Climate Justice Community Change Program. The IRA "will invest approximately \$2 billion dollars in Inflation Reduction Act funds in environmental and climate justice activities to benefit disadvantaged communities." [EPA, 7/20/24]

The Inflation Reduction Act Allocated \$6.2 Billion To The Department Of The Interior To 'Tackle The Climate Crisis.' According to the U.S. Department of the Interior's website, the IRA provided the department "\$6.2 billion, enabling our bureaus and offices to play a leading role in advancing key habitat restoration, land resilience and water projects, and securing environmental justice for historically disadvantaged communities." This included: \$4.6 Billion to "advance system conservation and mitigate drought impacts," \$700 million to "advance conservation, restoration and resilience activities on our public lands," \$500 million to "support additional staffing at the National Park Service," and \$425 million to "support communities prepare for and adapt to worsening threats brought on by the climate crisis." [U.S. Department of the Interior, Accessed 7/20/24]

The Inflation Reduction Act Provided Funding For USDA Rural Development. According to the USDA, the Inflation Reduction Act "provides funding to USDA Rural Development to help eligible entities purchase renewable energy and zero-emission systems and make energy-efficiency improvements that will significantly reduce greenhouse gas emissions." This included "Up to \$1 billion for RUS loans for renewable energy infrastructure. The Act requires the agency to forgive up to 50% of the loan amount. Eligible entities include electric service providers, including municipals, cooperatives, investor-owned and Tribal utilities. [...] Up to \$2.025 billion for the RBCS Rural Energy for America Program (REAP), with \$303 million set aside for underutilized technologies and technical assistance. [...] Up to \$500 million in RBCS grants for infrastructure improvements to blend, store or distribute biofuels. This includes installing, retrofitting or upgrading dispensers for ethanol at retail stations as well as home heating oil distribution centers. [...] Up to \$9.7 billion for RUS to offer loans, grants, loan modifications and other financial assistance to support the purchase of renewable energy systems, zeroemission systems and carbon capture systems. Funding also may be used to deploy these systems or to make energy-efficiency improvements to generation and transmission systems of eligible entities." [USDA, Accessed 7/20/24]

The Inflation Reduction Act Provided \$100 Million For Environmental Review Implementation For Surface Transportation Projects. According to the Federal Highway Administration, the Inflation Reduction Act allocated "\$100 million to facilitate the development and review of documents for the environmental review process for proposed surface transportation projects." The Inflation Reduction Act Provided \$2 Billion For Low-Carbon Transportation Materials Grants. According to the Federal Highway Administration, the Inflation Reduction Act allocated "\$2.0 billion to reimburse or provide incentives to eligible recipients for the use, in projects, of construction materials and products that have substantially lower levels of embodied greenhouse gas emissions associated with all relevant stages of production, use, and disposal as compared to estimated industry averages of similar materials or products as determined by the Administrator of the Environmental Protection Agency." 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



Alaska's Trawler Bycatch Included Hundreds Of Thousands Of Chum Salmon And Tens Of Thousands Of King Salmon Annually, Killing Fish. "Bycatch occurs in every fishery that targets a specific species, but while seeking pollock and cod in a billion-dollar industry, Alaska's trawlers inadvertently catch tens of thousands of king salmon and hundreds of thousands of chum salmon in their nets each year, according to observations by the National Marine Fisheries Service. By law, the salmon must be returned to the ocean, but fish die in the process. The amount of bycatch fluctuates from year to year and has fallen in the recent past, but the sheer numbers of fish caught by trawlers has aroused public ire. A Facebook group calling itself 'Stop Alaskan Trawler Bycatch' now boasts almost 20,000 members, and various groups have called on the North Pacific Fisheries Management Council — which regulates fisheries more than 3 miles off Alaskan shores — to more tightly cap bycatch." 


