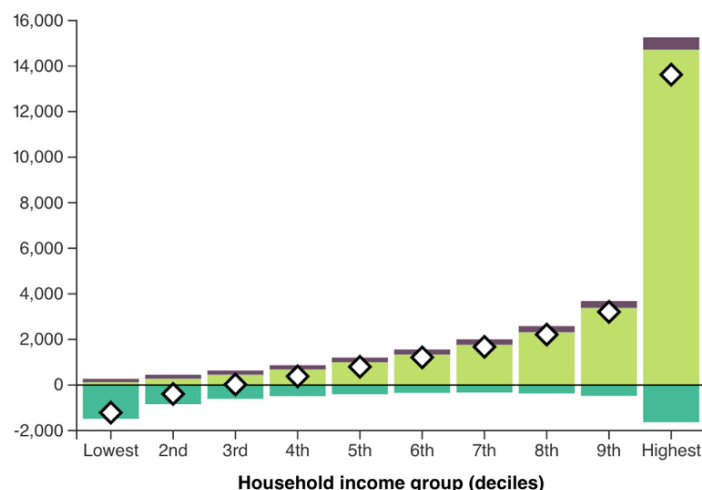

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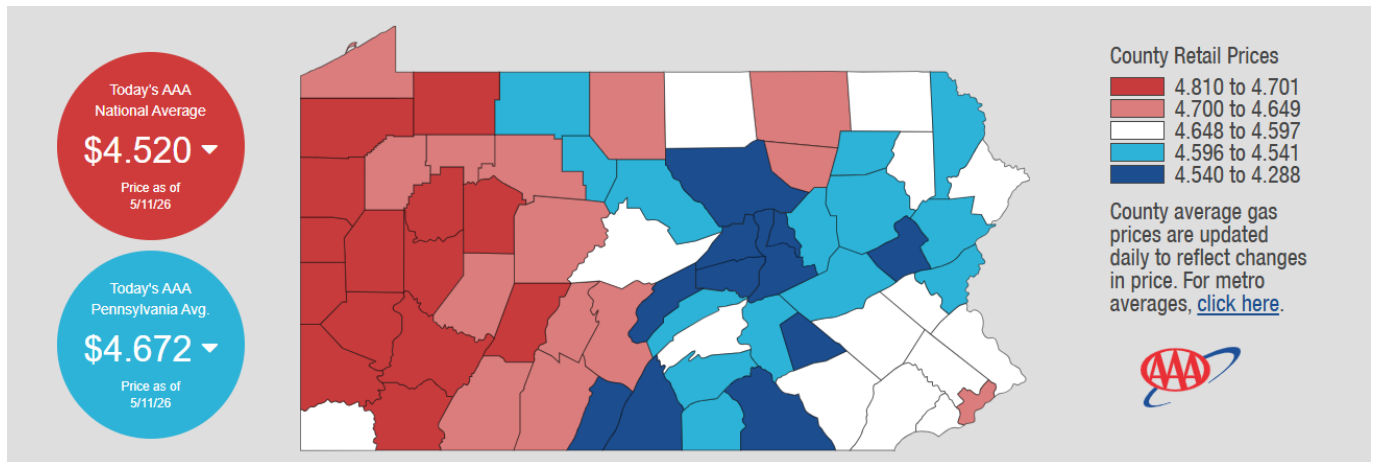

In January 2026, customers were hit with an additional 6.8% increase in Union County and a further 18% for Wellsboro Electric customers in Tioga County. Furthermore, we intend to include language which would prohibit the use of the barbaric dismemberment abortion practice. Dismemberment abortions occur when a baby's life is terminated by removing their limbs.” Ryan Mackenzie voted for the bill, which passed the state House 132-65 but did not advance in the state Senate.
