Nunn’s pivot comes as affordability issues increasingly dominate the 2026 race. 2025: Nunn “Voted To Scrap A Biden-Era Rule That Would Have Capped Overdraft Fees At \$5 For Large Banks.” “But nine months earlier, Nunn voted to scrap a Biden-era rule that would have capped overdraft fees at \$5 for large banks. Banking trade groups opposed the measure, which was projected to save working Americans billions of dollars. Nunn made a similar move in April 2024 when he voted to block a rule capping credit card late fees at \$8. Without the rule, credit card companies can charge up to \$30 for an initial missed payment and \$41 for additional missed payments. Consumers stood

to save \$220 a year if the rule had been enacted, while credit card companies would have lost \$11 billion in revenue.” [American Journal News, [5/13/26](#)]

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2025: Nunn Voted For The One Big Beautiful Bill Which Was A Massive Giveaway To Big Pharma By Cutting Their Taxes And Undermining Medicare’s Ability To Negotiate Drug Prices

2025: Nunn Voted Twice For The One Big Beautiful Bill

May 22, 2025: Nunn Voted For Initial Passage Of The One Big Beautiful Bill. On May 22, 2025, Representative Zach Nunn voted for: “Passage of the bill that would provide for approximately \$3.8 trillion in net tax cuts and \$321 billion in military, border enforcement and judiciary spending, offset by \$1.5 trillion in spending reductions, as instructed in the fiscal 2025 budget resolution (H Con Res 14). It would raise the statutory debt limit by \$4 trillion and provide for increased spending on defense and border security, spending cuts on social safety net programs, such as Medicaid and the Supplemental Nutrition Assistance Program. It also includes a mix of tax breaks for businesses and individuals; tax increases on universities and foundations; and a phase-down of clean energy tax credits. It would reduce spending on Medicaid by \$625 billion over a 10-year period and modify eligibility and cost provisions for enrollees and health providers and impose work, volunteer and education requirements on adults ages 19

to 64 who are covered by the program. It would appropriate “such sums as necessary” for reducing cost-sharing payments for low-income individuals who’ve purchased “silver” plans on the 2010 health care law’s exchanges. But payments to plans that cover abortions would be mostly barred. It would extend and make permanent individual tax brackets and rates included in the 2017 tax overhaul law (PL 115-97) and provide for the adjustment of the lower bounds of each tier based on inflation. It would reduce federal spending on the Supplemental Nutrition Assistance Program by requiring states to shoulder more of the cost, expand work requirements for SNAP, extend programs authorized under the 2018 farm bill, and prohibit the U.S. Department of Agriculture from increasing the cost of the Thrifty Food Program. As amended, it would cap state and local tax deductions at \$40,000 for households with incomes below \$500,000 and prohibit Medicaid funding for gender transition therapies or procedures for minors and adults, among other provisions.” The bill passed by a vote of 215-214. July 3, 2025: Nunn Voted For The Final Passage Of The One Big Beautiful Bill. On July 3, 2025, Representative Zach Nunn voted for: “Motion to concur in the Senate amendment to the bill that would permanently extend nearly \$4 trillion in expiring individual and business tax cuts, create several new tax breaks and fund border and immigration enforcement and air traffic control upgrades. It would cut Medicaid and other safety net programs to partly offset the cost. Among other provisions, it would raise the statutory debt ceiling by \$5 trillion and appropriate more than \$448 billion in mandatory funding for Trump administration priorities and other needs, including \$153 billion for defense, \$89 billion for immigration enforcement, and \$89.5 billion for border control and security. It also would increase the state and local tax deduction cap to \$40,000 annually for five years for households making up to \$500,000 a year until 2030, when it would permanently revert to \$10,000.” Motion agreed to 218-214. The Big Beautiful Bill Cut Taxes For Corporations, Including Big Pharma Companies

Institute On Taxation And Economic Policy: The Big Beautiful Bill “Pushed Through” Tax Cuts For Corporations. “At least 88 of the largest corporations in America paid no federal corporate income taxes in their most recent fiscal year despite enjoying substantial pretax profits in the U.S. While the biggest U.S. corporations have avoided taxes in this way for decades, it appears that corporate tax avoidance has increased in the most recent year. This is at least in part due to two separate packages of corporate tax cuts pushed through by the Trump administration: last year’s ‘One Big Beautiful Bill Act’ and the 2017 Tax Cuts and Jobs Act (TCJA).” [Institute on Taxation and Economic Policy, [4/14/26](#)]

The One Big Beautiful Bill Included Reforms To The Medicare Drug Price Negotiation Program Which Would Provide \$8.8 Billion For Big Pharma

The Congressional Budget Office Estimated The One Big Beautiful Bill’s Delay And Exemption Of Certain Pharmaceutical Drugs From The Medicare Drug Price Negotiation Program Would Cost \$8.8 Billion Over 10 Years. “You have asked the Congressional Budget Office to provide a revised estimate of the budgetary effects of section 71203 of the 2025 reconciliation act. That section delays or exempts certain drugs from selection for the Medicare Drug Price Negotiation Program, which directed the Department of Health and Human Services to negotiate with pharmaceutical manufacturers for the prices that Medicare will pay for certain drugs covered under Part B and Part D of the program. CBO’s July 2025 estimate did not include the effects of the policy on price negotiation for several orphan drugs, including Darzalex (daratumumab) Keytruda (pembrolizumab), and Opdivo (nivolumab). 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- **2026: Centers for Medicaid & Medicare Services, “CMS,” Selected A Drug That Treated “Blood Cancers” For Drug Price Negotiation.** “Based on the negotiated prices for first 10 Part D drugs selected for negotiation, CMS estimated that Medicare would have saved \$6 billion if the prices that CMS negotiated had been in effect in 2023, amounting to net savings of 22% on these drugs. CMS also estimated that Medicare beneficiaries will save \$1.5 billion when these negotiated prices take effect in 2026. Based on negotiated prices for the next 15 Part D drugs selected for negotiation, CMS estimated even greater savings of \$12 billion relative to existing net prices in 2024, amounting to net savings of 44% on these medications – higher due in part to the larger number of drugs subject to negotiation. CMS has also estimated that Medicare beneficiaries will save \$685 million when these negotiated prices take effect in 2027. Selected Drugs for Implementation Year 2026: The first 10 Medicare Part D drugs that were selected for negotiation include treatments for several medical conditions, including diabetes (Farxiga, Fiasp/NovoLog, Januvia, Jardiance), blood clots (Eliquis, Xarelto), heart failure (Entresto, Farxiga), psoriasis (Stelara, Enbrel), rheumatoid arthritis (Enbrel), Crohn’s disease (Stelara), and blood cancers (Imbruvica) (Table 2). Medicare’s negotiated prices took effect on January 1, 2026. CMS published explanations of its negotiated prices and the factors that

were considered in the negotiation process, including manufacturer-specific financial data about the selected drugs and evidence about the clinical benefits of selected drugs compared to alternative treatments.” [KFF, [3/11/26](#)]

Specialty Drugs Used To Treat “Cancer, Autoimmune Diseases, And Rare Conditions” Costs “Anywhere From \$2,000 Per Month Per Patient To Hundreds Of Thousands Of Dollars Per Year.” “Specialty drugs—such as high-cost treatments for cancer, autoimmune diseases, and rare conditions—now make up at least half of pharmaceutical spending. Plus, they’re growing at a rapid rate. The specialty pharmaceuticals market grew from \$92.50 billion in 2023 to \$129.23 billion in 2024. It’s expected to reach an eye-popping \$965.54 billion by 2030. While these medications are often necessary, they’re also expensive. 2018: Nunn Voted For A Bill Which Allowed Insurance Plans To Deny Coverage For People With Pre-Existing Conditions

March 2018: Nunn Voted For SF2349, To Allow The Sale Of Some Insurance Plans That Evaded Essential Health Benefits Requirements And Could Deny Coverage Based On Pre-Existing Conditions. In March 2018, Zach Nunn voted for “an act relating to health plans established by associations of employers or sponsored by certain agricultural organizations.” According to the Des Moines Register, “the legislation would give small employers more freedom to band together to buy health insurance for their workers through ‘association health plans.’ It effectively would allow insurance carriers to resume selling small-employer policies that don’t meet Affordable Care Act rules, also known as Obamacare, such as those requiring coverage for maternity care or addiction treatment... The new coverage could offer relatively low premiums for young and healthy consumers, but people with pre-existing health problems could once again be charged more or denied coverage.” The bill passed by a vote of 69-30 with one absent or non-voting member. Cancer Was A Pre-Existing Condition

US Department Of Health And Human Services: Cancer Was A Pre-Existing Condition. “Health insurance companies cannot refuse coverage or charge you more just because you have a ‘pre-existing condition’ — that is, a health problem you had before the date that new health coverage starts. Health insurers can no longer charge more or deny coverage to you or your child because of a pre-existing health condition like asthma, diabetes, or cancer, as well as pregnancy. They cannot limit benefits for that condition either. Once you have insurance, they can’t refuse to cover treatment for your pre-existing condition.” [US Department of Health and Human Services, accessed [6/2/26](#)]

People With Pre-Existing Conditions Included Cancer Survivors. “If you are a cancer survivor or have been previously diagnosed with or treated for cancer, your health insurer might claim your cancer is a pre-existing condition, therefore, any expenses associated with cancer in the future will not be covered. A medical illness or injury that is present before you start a new healthcare plan could be considered a pre-existing condition. Chronic or long-term conditions like diabetes, chronic obstructive pulmonary disease, cancer, kidney disease, and other diseases may be considered pre-existing health conditions. [...] Under the Affordable Care Act, health insurance companies may not refuse coverage or charge more to

those with pre-existing conditions. Insurers are not allowed to charge more or refuse to pay for essential health benefits for any condition present before coverage begins.
