2001: Green “Landed A Low-Level Political Appointment At The Department Of Defense At The Pentagon.” “A former Eagle Scout and Vero Beach High School graduate, Green had earned bachelor's and master's degrees at American and Florida State universities. While in school he'd also worked on campaigns for Jeb Bush, who became Florida's governor, and George W. Bush, who became president in 2000. After the presidential election, Green served on Bush's inaugural committee and landed a low-level political appointment at the Department of Defense at the Pentagon. He enrolled in a political science doctorate program at George Washington University, earning a degree in 2012. Green said he was ‘dumbfounded’ and ‘shocked’ by the attack, but he knew of the terrorist group al-Qaida. He remembered its attack Oct. 12, 2000, on the USS Cole in Yemen, which killed 17 U.S. sailors, including fellow VBHS student Ronald Scott Owens, 24. On Sept. 12, 2001, Green returned to work, wearing a mask because fires continued to burn on the west side of the complex. “Tarin Kowt, a town in the mountains of the Oruzgan province of Afghanistan, is a place Dan Green still doesn't know much about, though he'll soon be living there. Small and remote, more than 200 miles from the country's capital of Kabul, it's the sort of place U.S. troops get to by helicopter, where soldiers wash laundry in buckets and sleeping in barracks rather than tents is a luxury. It's also a dangerous place. Only a few days ago, two soldiers were killed in the province by an improvised explosive device. The same day, others found stores of weapons kept by Taliban militants who remain in the area. Beyond that, Green, 28, a Vero Beach High School graduate now working as a political appointee to the State Department, is not sure what to expect when he arrives there in January. He asked for the six-month assignment in Tarin Kowt, where he'll work with a group of Americans -- some military, some from the U.S. Agency for International Development -- as part of what's called a provincial reconstruction team. They'll help with construction projects, building ties with local leaders, all with the hope of extending the authority of the fledgling Afghan government throughout the country. Green will travel through the Oruzgan province with an interpreter and guards, working for the U.S. embassy in Kabul as a local diplomat. ‘My task is to operate as eyes and ears of the embassy in the provinces,’ Green said. His main concern with his new assignment is how he'll be received by the people in Tarin Kowt, and how much he'll be able to help.” [Press Journal, 11/27/04]

Slate: The Foundation For Defense Of Democracies Billed Itself As “A Non-Partisan Policy Institute” But Was A Republican-Backed Organization Aligned With The Israeli Right. “FDD bills itself as ‘a non-partisan policy institute’ in the tradition of groups like the Council on Foreign Relations. Legally speaking, that’s true. But while FDD once had a few Democrats on its Board of Advisors, and can still find a few Democrats like Menendez who are receptive to its message, it has become a Republican-backed organization that reflects the growing political polarization in Washington. FDD also describes itself as a global research organization. Its purpose, it says, is to conduct ‘research and provide education on international terrorism—the most serious security threat to the United States and other free, democratic nations.’ But it has conducted its research from a particular vantage point and with a relatively narrow focus. Its research and advocacy have centered on the Middle East and in particular on conflicts and issues that impinge on Israel. And its positions have closely tracked those of the Likud party and its leader, Prime Minister Benjamin Netanyahu—not just on the Iran deal, but on the conflict between the Israelis and the Palestinians and the desirability of a two-state solution. Understanding the think tank’s ideological affinity with the Israeli government, and the roots of that affinity, helps explain the special

role that FDD has played in opposing the Iran deal and may shed light on what FDD hopes to accomplish by derailing President Obama's signature foreign policy accomplishment." [Slate, [8/18/15](#)]

KFF: The Big Beautiful Bill Cut Medicaid By Nearly \$1 Trillion. “On July 4, President Trump signed into law a budget reconciliation package once called the ‘One Big, Beautiful Bill’ that made major reductions in federal health care spending to offset part of the costs of extending expiring tax cuts. The Congressional Budget Office’s (CBO) latest cost estimate shows that the reconciliation package would reduce federal Medicaid spending over a decade by an estimated \$911 billion (after accounting for

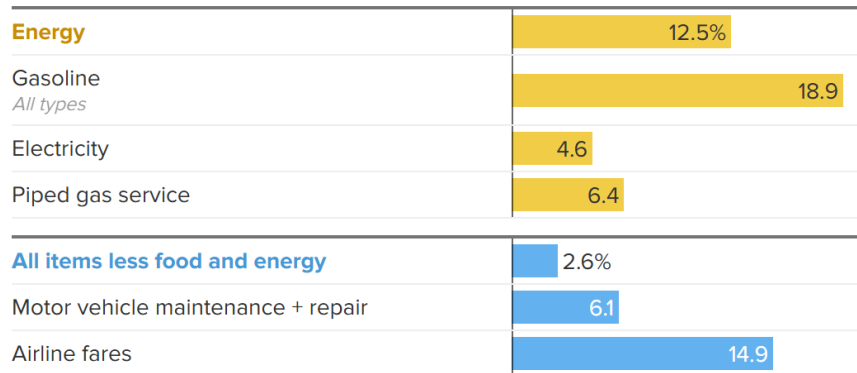
